VICTORY AGAIN FOR CANADA.

The Third Race an Easy Victory.

THE DOMINION SAILED BETTER THAN HER OPPONENT.

Took the Lead and Kept it—Won by a Mile and a Half.

MONTREAL, Aug. 17.—The Dominion yesterday had it easy in defeating the Challenger in a course calling for a beat to windward and a run home. Three times round.

The race was sailed in a heavy wind, necessitating double reefs, and the Dominion showed herself to be much the better boat, winning by about a mile and a half in 5 minutes and 26 seconds.

The race was started at 12.40, the Challenger was first across and the Dominion came so quickly after her that she gained the windward position almost at once.

It seemed a question of how much her lead would be that was all.

As on every previous occasion, she distanced the American in beating up to the windward, thus it was that when the long tack to starboard had been run in order to reach the mark boat, the Challenger was hopelessly behind, unless she could make up a difference of nearly three minutes.

This she had never been able to do on any of the previous runs before the wind and unless something unlooked for occurred it seemed plainly a very easy win for the Dominion.

The Challenger made up considerably more than a minute on the home run in the closing round, it did not make her dangerous however.

When the yachts had rounded the stake boat to commence the second round, the Dominion's lead was irrecoverable.

There was no feature in the second round, except that the Dominion closed the first half of the race with a lead of over five minutes.

From this time forward it was a question as to what time the Dominion would win by.

SEVERE HAIL AND RAIN STORM

In New Brunswick and New England.

DAMAGE DONE IN BOSTON AND CALAIS.

Church Struck by Lightning at St. Stephen, N. B.

St. JOHN, N. B., Aug. 18.—A big rain, hail and wind storm swept the valley of the St. Croix yesterday afternoon. It struck the town of Calais and St. Stephen pretty hard, tearing down shade trees and doing other damage.

BOSTON, Aug. 18.—There was a severe thunderstorm with downfall of destructive hail, the hailstones being over an inch in diameter.

St. STEPHEN, Aug. 18.—A church was struck by lightning here yesterday and partially destroyed by fire.

Throughout Maine and Massachusetts the storm did much damage.

SPANISH BODIES CREMATED.

Disease Rampant in the Cuban Camp and Mortality Great.

Santiago de Cuba, Aug. 17.—The embarkation of the prisoners is being pushed with great activity. This is rendered imperative by their horrible condition. The mortality is so great in the Spanish camp, where disease is rampant, that no longer are the dead buried. A funeral pile of 10 or 12 bodies is made, saturated with kerosene, and set fire to, cremating the bodies in the open air.

Hot in Europe.

LONDON, August 17.—A great heat wave has prevailed through England and France during the last three days, the thermometer in London registering 85 degrees in the shade and 127 degrees in the sun. On Saturday a large number of persons suffering from sunstroke were admitted to the hospital. In addition to the intense heat a dense fog in the English Channel has caused much inconvenience. Paris is still hotter. Lieutenant Colonel Longuet fell from his horse and died from the effects of a sunstroke during the manoeuvres at Beziers. In the mountain districts of Austria extreme cold prevails, the thermometer registering within a few hours a fall from 100 degrees to 40 degrees. Heavy falls of snow have occurred at Innsbruck, Gratz and elsewhere.

Newfoundland Commission.

St. JOHN'S, Aug. 17.—The composition of the Royal Commission and the scope of its enquiry are to be settled at once. Reliable local papers, presumably from the information brought by Sir James Winter, the Premier, state that the commissioners will likely be Sir John Bramston, Permanent Under-Secretary of State for the Colonies, and Admiral Erskine, formerly in command of the British North American fleet.

MARTIN JOINS SEMLIN'S CABINET.

The New Coalition Ministry

ACCEPTED ATTORNEY-GENERAL SHIP OF BRITISH COLUMBIA.

Four Members Sworn in—Names Canceled for the Other Vacancies.

VANCOUVER, Aug. 17.—Mr C. A. Semlin, the Opposition leader, who was called by the Lieutenant Governor to form a cabinet after the failure of Hon. Mr. Beaven, has succeeded in forming a coalition Ministry.

Premier Semlin has retained to himself the direction of the Public Works Department. Joseph Martin has waived his personal feelings and accepts the Attorney-Generalship. F. C. Cotton has been selected as Finance Minister, and has also accepted. These three Ministers were sworn in yesterday afternoon, and the remaining members of the Cabinet will be chosen and installed before the close of the week. J. M. Kellie, Thomas Foster, and Robert E. Green, of Kaslo, are mentioned, but have not yet been named by the Premier.

While two of the most important portfolios are given Vancouver city, the whole of Vancouver Island has been absolutely disregarded.
