From Yesterday's 5 o'clock Edition.

HONG KONG, May 27, (Midnight, Greenwich time).—The United States auxiliary cruiser Zatairo has just arrived here from Manila having on board the Captain of the Olympia and two officers who have been invalided.

The situation at Manila is unchanged and the insurgents are quiet.

The report that the Commander of the gun boat was tried by court-martial and shot for not firing on the American ship which captured the Callo is untrue.

The Zatairo will return to Manila on Monday next.

LONDON, May 28.—A despatch to the Financial News from Kingston, Jamaica says the master of the fishing schooner Jane, which has arrived there, reports having picked up a yawl containing two concentrators who had escaped from Santiago de Cuba.

He says they told him that Admiral Cervera's squadron was in the harbor, that the vessels were coaled and victualled and were ready to sail "when the Cadiz squadron arrives next week and breaks the blockade."

WASHINGTON, May 28.—The military situation as at present determined upon by those in authority is to make no forward movement of troops either upon Porto Rico or Cuba until definite information is received as to the location of the Spanish squadron.

Unless the Navy Department secure some direct and official information respecting the Spanish and the American fleets within the next 24 hours through the aid of the West Indian cables it will resort to the use of despatch boats.

It can be again affirmed on the highest authority that at the close of the day the department had nothing more than a belief founded on unofficial advices that the Spanish squadron was lying in Santiago harbor, and on news at all as to Commodore Schley's whereabouts.

MADRID, May 28.—General Blanco cables from Havana that the torpedo boat destroyer Terror, from Martinique, had arrived at Fajardo, on the east coast of Porto Rico.

General Blanco's despatch says that Admiral Cervera's squadron is still at Santiago de Cuba, that the bulk of Admiral Sampson's squadron is blockading that port, and that Commodore Schley's squadron is watching the Yucatan passage. He also states that the American vessels have left Cienfuegos, and that the American fleet of blockaders remains in sight of Havana.

KEY WEST, May 28.—E. P. Knight, the correspondent of the London Times, who on Sunday night, when seven miles off Havana, was lowered over the bow of a despatch boat and rowed ashore alone, was heard from today. He has been thrown into prison and is now in the Cardenas fortress.

Alex. Callon, the British Consul at Havana, has instituted proceedings for his release.

WASHINGTON, May 28.—The State Department has been notified by British Consul Gollan at Havana that an exchange of prisoners had been effected and the Maple with Charles Thrall and Hadden Jones the American correspondents on board has sailed for Key West.

ANNUAL REPORT

Of the Prince Edward Island Hospital for the Year 1896-7.

The Trustees beg to present the following report of the progress of the Hospital for the past year.

The general account for the year herewith submitted shows the cash subscriptions for the year for the maintenance of the Institution to be \$953 73, somewhat in excess of the previous year. The church collections were \$308.76, being somewhat short of those of the previous year. The amount received from entertainments was \$59.55, being less than half that of the last year. The patients' fees amount to \$1170 93, slightly in excess of the previous year.

A sum of \$69 75 was received for nurses' fees, and \$10, refrigerator sold, making with the balance on hand 25th May, 1897, a total credit of \$3336.71.

The expenditure on current accounts for the year amounts to \$2720.08, which leaves a balance on hand of \$616.63.

The endowment fund of \$260 38 to the 6th day of April last was on that date, by order of the trustees, transferred to the New Hospital account. This fund has been since increased to \$604.60 by sundry accounts, viz:

The trustees beg to refer to the various schedules herewith annexed, containing in detail all the medical and other statistics, whereby it appears that the number of patients admitted during the year was 149, being somewhat in excess of the previous year, making with the 11 in hospital at the end of last year 160 patients treated during the year. Of these 70 were males and 90 females, while 51 were from the city of Charlottetown, 96 from the country districts, and 13 from the other provinces. The number of paying patients was 77, and non-paying 83. The number of our patients was 59, and prescriptions were furnished to 171 out patients.

The medical cases were 59, surgical 101, and there were 90 operations of the 101 surgical cases. There were 112 cases discharged, cured, improved 25, not treated 2, incurable 5, died 5, remaining in hospital 11.

On the 26th day of March last four nurses graduated from the training school and received their Diplomas, having passed very successful examinations. These were Misses Sinclair, Ross, Wiggins and Gordon.

The graduating exercises took place in the Kindergarten Hall, which was graciously offered for the occasion by its trustee, and which was crowded to the doors.

Again we beg to thank the Ladies' Aid Society for their valuable co-operation in the interests of the hospital. Their report is herewith annexed. We beg to thank all the collectors in town and country for their valuable services. Our thanks are likewise justly due to the medical staff, and to clergy-men of the several denominations, not forgetting the Rev John Goodwill, for their good services in the interests of the hospital.

As soon as the subscription list for the new Jubilee hospital amounted to a sum which warranted the trustees in applying to the Rev Dr Brecken for fil-

filment of his generous promise to grant the valuable site for a new building, the trustees entered into correspondence with that gentleman on the subject, and he reports to us that he will be in Charlottetown about the middle of next month, and will execute such documents as may be necessary to make good his promise. In the meantime your trustees have had under consideration plans for the new building, and have decided upon a suitable plan of a brick building to be faced with Nova Scotia free stone, with all modern improvements.

The trustees have decided to call for tenders for the erection of a hospital, in accordance with the plans to be accepted by the Board. This building will cost with the heating, &c., in all probability a larger sum than the amount subscribed. But the trustees are satisfied that the balance required to finish and equip a hospital suitable to the present requirements of our people will be forthcoming on demand being made for it, as, up to the present time almost the whole amount subscribed has come from residents of the city.

The subscription list at present amounts to the sum of \$10,706. Tenders for the new building will be advertised for in a few days.

The matron and nurses continue to give every satisfaction in the discharge of their duties. On the removal from the Island of Mr J Pitblado, one of our trustees, His Honor, Mr Justice Fitzgerald, was elected by the Board to fill his place.

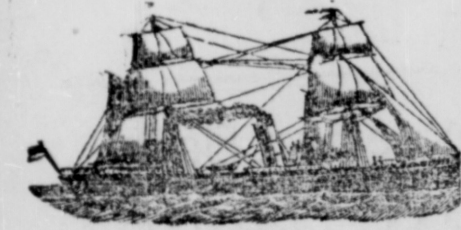
