

# Anne Stacey To Represent N. S. In Tennis Play

HALIFAX (CP)—Anne Stacey, 19, Nova Scotia's second-ranked player, will represent the province in the national senior tennis championships which start Monday at Toronto.

Miss Stacey, who won both the provincial junior and senior women's singles titles in 1952, paired with Carolyn Flemming of Truro several years ago to win the national under-15-years doubles title. She was a member of the Nova Scotia team which won the Canadian inter-provincial team championship last year.

# Annapolis Valley Hopes To Regain U.K. Apple Market

KENTVILLE, N. S. (CP)—The Annapolis valley still lives in hopes of better days.

For in this apple eden which once turned out 40 per cent of Canada's crop, things aren't what they used to be before the war.

The estimated crop this year is 2,100,000 bushels, double that of last year but still a far cry from the average 4,000,000-bushels output of the pre-war years.

Behind it all is the story of markets, and as far as the valley is concerned the big item was the post-war loss of the United Kingdom market which once took 80 per cent of the province's apples.

Nova Scotia's growers still hope they will some day recapture at least part of this market.

### STOPPED BY DOLLAR LACK

The U.K. started to purchase Nova Scotia apples in 1895 and was a steady customer until the Second World War. After the war her dollar troubles prevented any purchases.

As a result the apple industry of the Annapolis valley underwent a major revolution. Trees which bore fruit in demand in the U.K. were uprooted and varieties more suited to the domestic market were substituted.

With government financial aid, the growers tore out half of their 2,000,000 trees. Some say that in the long run they'll be better off.

But new markets were hard to find and still are. And while some new ones have been found, most growers are convinced that sales on the British market are necessary for life in the industry over a long period.

# Arctic Patrol Ship Completes Maiden Voyage

HALIFAX (CP)—The 6,400-ton navy Arctic patrol ship Labrador arrived at her base here Wednesday after a successful maiden voyage from Borel, Que. Capt. O. C. Robertson said the vessel was preparing immediately for the navy's first venture on a far northern patrol.

The ship is packed to the gunwales with scientific equipment and scientists, and ready to make her first patrol starting July 22.

The Labrador will check Arctic charts, maps, weather, the cosmic rays, oceanography and other Arctic conditions.

The information will be directed to the armed forces for use in planning the defence of this area and the use of it from a military standpoint.

Officers, men and scientists are still getting used to the new ship and the array of gadgets and scientific equipment after a shakedown cruise down the St. Lawrence.

The ship is equipped with the latest type of stabilizers, two helicopters, a jeep with a snorkel for use through Arctic muskeg, futuristic cosmic ray devices and radar screens.

# Secret British Jet Crashes On Trial Flight

GRANFIELD, Eng. (AP)W—A secret four-engined British jet atom bomber crashed in the airfield of an aeronautical college Wednesday, killing the crew of four.

Eyewitness Frederick Lovejoy said the tail dropped off during a trial flight.

The crescent-winged Victor, a prototype of planes now on super-priority production orders for the R.A.F. could fly near the speed of sound. It was 10 times as powerful as the heaviest Second World War bomber.

A spokesman for the makers, Handley Page Limited, said "this was the first big prototype Victor. We are expecting a second prototype to fly soon."

Handley Page insisted that no other bomber, however, could fly as fast, as far and as high with as great a bomb load as the Victor. It could reach 55,000 feet and have a range of 8,000 miles.

# Overland Special Passengers Greeted

EDMONTON, (CP)—Nearly 100 transplanted westerners arrived here Wednesday aboard the CNR "Overland Special" and were treated to a breakfast reception given by the Maritimes Provinces Association of Edmonton.

The guests were westerners who were raised here and went to live in the Maritimes. They were welcomed back on their fifth annual trip to their birthplace by Alberta Lieutenant-Governor J. J. Bowlen, a native of Prince Edward Island.

After their four-hour visit to Edmonton, the "western-bluesoners" climbed aboard the train once more for Vancouver.

Saturday, a "Bluenose Special" train, arranged by the Edmonton Association, will leave Edmonton for the east carrying a group of transplanted Maritimers on an excursion to the Atlantic seaboard.

# Attendance At Major Ball Parks Up This Season

NEW YORK (AP)—Attendance at the major league ball parks has been on the upswing this season as compared to the turnstile figures a year ago.

A mid-season survey by the Associated Press revealed Wednesday that 11 of the 16 major league teams are ahead of their 1954 attendance pace and combined they show an increase of 834,028 paid admissions over last season. Figures include games through last Sunday.

The American League has drawn 4,368,584 fans and 4,248,197 customers have watched the National League for a grand total of 8,616,781. The same number of home dates attracted 7,782,753 last season.

The shifting of the St. Louis franchise to Baltimore has proved beneficial to American League attendance. The Orioles already have played to 661,746 fans to exceed the final St. Louis total for 1953. Baltimore shows a jump of 452,686 over the corresponding Brownie figures of a year ago.

### AMERICAN AHEAD

American League clubs are 701,456 customers ahead of last season with both the Detroit Tigers and Chicago White Sox showing substantial boosts. The Tigers have attracted a turnout of 163,304 more than their 1953 figure, while the White Sox are up 105,178. Chicago also had the most paid admissions in the league, 704,444.

In the National League the first place New York Giants show the biggest rise—a gain of 151,886 over last year. The Giants, who have attracted 670,273 fans for 39 home dates, drew only 811,518 for the 1953 season.

Milwaukee, picking up where it left off last season after setting an all-time National League attendance mark of 1,826,397, has boosted its turnstile take by 10,128 paid admissions. The Braves, in 38 home dates, already have played host to 965,000 fans—most in the majors.

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**BY-LAW TO AMEND THE BY-LAW TO REGULATE TRAFFIC**

BE IT ENACTED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF CHARLOTTETOWN AS FOLLOWS:

1. That the By-law to Regulate Traffic in the City of Charlottetown be amended by adding the following thereto as section 22 thereof:

22A. Notwithstanding anything otherwise appearing in this By-law if and where any street approaching an intersection is marked off into three traffic lanes every vehicle approaching and entering the intersection on such street shall proceed as follows:

Vehicles turning right in the intersection shall approach in the right hand lane and turn right into the right hand lane of the intersecting street, especially guarding all pedestrians.

Vehicles continuing straight through the intersection shall approach in the centre lane and leave the intersection in the right hand lane.

Vehicles turning left in the intersection shall approach in the centre lane and turn left into the right hand lane of the intersecting street as other traffic may allow, especially guarding all pedestrians.

Designation of lanes (i.e. "right-hand") is in relation to the direction of the vehicle.
