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hard working and ask only that they be left in peace. The only crime charged to them is that they flood pasture and timber lands with their dams and utilize railway and highway embankments, on occasion, for their purpose. If half the money spent on removing the obstruction every morning from the road culvert in the swamp at the Glen was used to buy gravel, that was badly needed in any case to raise the road bed, they would still have the beaver, a much-needed dam and a passable road, and finished with a question, "Why the open season?"

Beavers are the engineers designed by Mother Nature to maintain water levels. Their dams serve two purposes: they conserve water and act as fire breaks when fire started by lightning or by man, breaks out in wilderness country. Ducks, trout and muskrats follow the beaver like a bunch of kids following a band wagon and all nature benefits. At the Fish and Game meeting held at Montague early in the winter a farmer sportsman from the Whim Road made an interesting comment on the beaver. He stated that he built a large dam in his district over a year ago and that the only wells that were not going dry this season were the wells in the water vein fed by the dam.

In this highly agricultural Province beaver can be a nuisance on occasion when they build dams in places where the landowner doesn't want a dam. The question doesn't arise in the minds of many at the moment is: "Does the nuisance content out weigh their contribution toward maintaining our water level, furnishing hunters, trappers and fishermen with ducks, trout and fur and benefitting the wildlife picture in general?"

Here is an urgent reminder to hunters and fishermen: The 1952 Fish and Game census returns are slow in coming in... just a mere trickle to date. This information is essential and if it is not forthcoming voluntarily some more effective means of placing it on record will have to be devised. At the moment there is no section in the Game Act covering prosecution of delinquents. However, it is within the power of the Minister to refuse a hunting or fishing license for 1953 if a return for 1952 has not been made. This procedure appears rather drastic and this columnist favours the collection of a small fee, five dollars for instance, from all who neglect to submit a Fish and Game Census return.
