TO THE ELECTORS OF THE FIRST DISTRICT OF QUEEN'S COUNTY.

GENTLEMEN; I am aware that there may be prejudices existing against the Relation of a Proprietor, or the heir of a Proprietor, to represent the people in Parliament; but I cannot believe that this prejudice can bear examination, because, if the Proprietor has done his duty towards his Tenants, he may as well challenge all the world to say whether or not there is any body who can be more interested either in their individual welfare or in the general prosperity of this Island, both in circumstances and position, than he is.
Whilst there are many who may have been deluded with the belief that, by the intervention of certain parties in the late House of Assembly, they had a chance of possessing themselves of the same Land as Freeholds which they had occupied as Leaseholds, I venture to think, that these delusions have been dissipated, not only by the reason of the thing, but by the declared will of the Queen, conveyed in the Despatch of Lord John Russell, her Colonial Minister, and the reiteration of such will by the Lieut. Governor of this Island.
I therefore stand before you as a future Proprietor, feeling that your interests and mine are bound up together. If any one attempts to tax your produce (as the last Assembly had attempted), who more interested than myself in resisting such an innovation? If any thing can be done to better your condition—to open to you better or more extended Markets, who so interested as I am? In effect, with whose interests can yours be more entirely blended than with my own?
The attempt that is daily made by ignorant, needy and disloyal individuals, to separate you from me, will indeed be futile, if there is that mutual confidence which, I trust, neither I nor any member of my family have done any thing to forfeit. It is, therefore, under the belief that our interests are mutual, that I venture thus to offer myself to your indulgence, as a Candidate to represent you in the ensuing Assembly; and I believe that the same relations which, I trust, exist between myself and my own Tenants may be such, that they will not deprive me of the support of all others who deem it necessary to return a Representative who will consider that he cannot neglect the interests of the Farmer without diminishing the value of his own property.
