CASES ADJOURNED
Seven Persons Plead Guilty

SUMMERSIDE — In Prince County Magistrate's Court here yesterday morning before Magistrate W. Chester S. MacDonald, a man of 26 and six teenagers were charged with damage to the East Bideford School to the extent of less than \$50 on Halloween night.

FOX BREEDERS

W.R. Shaw Addresses Annual Dinner Meeting

The work of the fox breeders in this province was one of the finest bits of initiative ever recorded here, Walter R. Shaw told the 35th annual dinner meeting of the provincial fox show here last night. Mr. Shaw is the former premier and now the leader of the Opposition here, but he spoke last night as the first Secretary of the fox show and the man who held that position through 24 successive shows.

President Clayton Mill, Clermont of the P.E.I. Fur Breeders Association presided. Other speakers were fox judge Parven Cass, Summerside; Mink Judge William MacFarlane Montreal, Lloyd Lockerby, Hamilton and Lowell Hancock, Summerside who reviewed some interesting bits of fox show history, and later showed slides of his 1965 trip to Europe as president Canada Mink Breeders.

An interesting feature of the evening was the address of appreciation read to Mr. Hancock by Mr. Lockerby; and the presentation on behalf of the association by Clayton Mill. The recognition was for the many years of valuable service to the fur breeders, particularly through the Maritime Fur Breeders magazine which Mr. Hancock published and edited for almost 30 years. The publication has been sold to a fur magazine based in Toronto, it was revealed.

There were 750 foxes in competition at the second provincial fox show in 1966. Mr. Shaw told the group which included exhibitors from this province and New Brunswick, and visit-

ors from as far away as Ontario. There was a tremendous interest in those days. The fox show pavilion was crowded, even the aisles were filled, he said. And the task of classifying that many foxes was a formidable one. The fox industry was the great stabilizing influence on the economy of this province in the depression-ridden Thirties, the guest speaker emphasized. Mr. Hancock said this is the only place in the world where silver fox shows are held annually, as he reviewed previous shows in detail that included aggregate and grand championship winners for each year.

Mr. Cass said he had only seen the Standard Silvers on the table but he thought the average quality compared favorably with animals he had seen in past years, particularly in reference to the much smaller numbers that are being shown now. Clayton Mill extended warm
