ADVANCE IN SUGAR.—Sugar has at last turned upward. There was an advance of 1c in New York this week, and now all the Canadian refineries are up 1c on granulated, with yellows up 1c to 2c, or fully 1c from the lowest point. The Acadia will not quote yellows at all. The advance was anticipated, and there was considerable buying during the last week by wholesalers.

BOARD OF TRADE

Question of Direct Communication With Great Britain.

An adjourned meeting of the Charlestown Board of Trade was held last evening in Mr. H. Hazard's office, the room in Masonic Temple being otherwise occupied.

There were present P. Blake (President), Mr. Campbell, manager of the Beaver line of steamers, Hon. D. Farquharson, Messrs. George Stanley, J. A. Farquharson, T. Handrahan, H. Hazard, N. Rattenbury, W. W. Beer, F. B. McLean, E. H. Beer, T. A. McLean, F. H. Beer, G. D. Longworth, W. Matheson, G. D. Longworth, L. Lafarge, J. A. Matheson, E. T. Higgs, W. L. Cotton and others.

After a lengthy general discussion, the following resolution, moved by Mr. Horace Hazard and seconded by Mr. Thomas A. McLean, was unanimously adopted:—

Resolved, that this Board assert the right of this Province to a subsidy sufficient to induce a line of Atlantic steamers to call at this port, and pledge the influence of its members to the development of a permanent trade directly between this Province and Great Britain.

A committee of five members was then appointed to wait upon the Minister of Marine and Fisheries and the Minister of Agriculture and urge the importance of calling at this port, and the committee was named as follows: T. Handrahan, H. Hazard, N. Rattenbury, G. D. Longworth, D. Farquharson, and the President, P. Blake.

The names of the following gentlemen were proposed for election at the next meeting, viz. G. D. Longworth, W. Matheson and H. W. Cotton and others.

On motion of Hon. D. Farquharson, seconded by G. D. Longworth, an unanimous vote of thanks was tendered Mr. Campbell for his kindness in coming to the Province to promote direct steam communication with Great Britain.

COUNTY COURT. The County Court has been sitting in Charlestown since Tuesday last, and adjourned to-day until Wednesday next for the delivery of judgments reserved, and for trial of suit of Emma Beers vs. Inland Steam Navigation Company, set down for that day.

Trustees School District No 222 (Terentius) vs. John T. Garland. School Assessment, \$18.61. This suit and four others involved the same defence, and was tried to determine the whole. The defendants sought payment on eight grounds of defence all of which were overruled and judgments given for plaintiffs for amounts claimed in all the suits.
