Prices Set For Top Grades Of Beef Steers Announced

Prices that may be anticipated for the three top grades of beef steers here this week were released to The Guardian-Patriot by J. Lincoln Dewar, secretary of the committee named by the farm producers to negotiate a formula with Canada Packers. Mr. Dewar noted that the price is for steers only.

For the present, it is given only on a rail grade, or dressed weight basis, although there are indications that later conversion figures may be supplied to indicate the approximate price on a live weight basis.

The price for "Red" steers is \$45.75 per 100 pounds; for "Blue" steers \$45.25 per hundredweight; and \$42.50 for "Standards" or "Browns". These are the only grades to which the formula applies.

Mr. Dewar pointed out that people who wish to get the approximate price on a live weight basis, can convert the price figures by multiplying the figure by the estimated dressing percentage.

from the commission and advocated a better deal not only for manufacturing industries "but for retail stores as well."

H. E. Langford, president of Chartered Trust Company, said the commission could do something to eliminate "wasteful administration" where federal and provincial tax interests overlap.

Canadian automobile manufacturers, with the exception of two companies, swung back into production last week after a month-long layoff due to annual vacations and model change-over periods.

Studebaker and American Motors are scheduled to begin production early this month. The automotive industry is having its best year in both sales and manufacturing figures in some time and news continues to be encouraging.

American Motors announced that its Chrysler automobiles set a record in factory sales to dealers during the 1962 model year. The company said 12,447 cars were sold to dealers compared with 7,950 in the peak year of 1956.

Business news was also encouraging elsewhere. In Kitchener, Dominion Electronics Industries Ltd. said it is setting up a United States subsidiary to be known as International Electronics Inc. The new company will be located at Bensenville, Ill., near Chicago, and will have a warehouse and sales office in New York.

A total of \$227,487 will be sought next month for the first year of operation of the P. E. I. United Fund, it was announced Saturday by R. E. Sellar, fund president, following a meeting of his executive with agency representatives.

The long-sought united appeal is the only province-wide united fund in Canada, and is designed to end the many and frequent appeals for funds made by various organizations in the province.

First campaign of the United Fund will be staged next month, with the entire October period being given to a canvass of the whole province.

The budget committee of the fund, comprised of members from all parts of the province, held a meeting in Charlottetown last week, and plans for services to the people of the province.

Aug. Weather Summary Is Given

SUMMERSIDE - L.A. Treacarter, officer in charge of weather forecasting at the "met" section, RCMP Summerside, said Saturday that August 1962, so far as precipitation is concerned, "started with a bang - people were holding their breath."

The forecaster stated that the normal was 3.29 inches. He explained that the normal is an average figure compiled from several years' records. August 1962 had 2.5 inches, somewhat below the normal measurements.

Temperatures throughout the month remained quite stable, he said, with the lows in the 60s and the highs in the 75s, with some minor variations.

Mr. Treacarter stated that it was a bit below the normal August level. "The weather in general can be described for the most part as sunny," he said, "the first part of the month was quite cloudy, but toward the end of the month, so about 15 days were sunny."
