LONDON (CP)—Children were blamed for so much damage at one civil defence training centre that officials decided to abandon it. Flood-lights were smashed, windows and doors broken and inflammable materials set on fire.



This is the special four-cent stamp to be issued in July to commemorate the XVIII International Red Cross Conference to be held in Toronto, July 23-August 9. The stamp is to be printed in blue and red—the third time that two-colored stamps have been issued in Canada. In 1898, the Imperial penny postage "map stamp" was printed in red and blue, and in 1939 another two-color stamp commemorated the visit of the King and Queen. This is the first time that Canada has been selected for an International Red Cross Conference, and only the second time that it has been held in the Western Hemisphere.
