"It is quite true," faltered Florabel, tears still falling like rain down her pale cheeks.

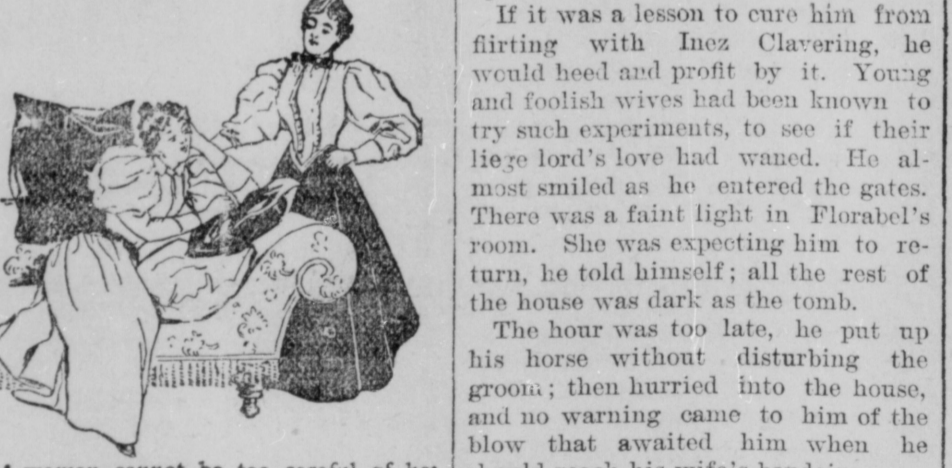
"Then, poor child, you ought to send for your relatives at once."
