

Eddy Sawyer Named Manager Of The Year

PHILADELPHIA, Nov. 8 (AP)—Little did Eddie Sawyer think two years ago that he would be baseball's manager of the year in 1950.

"It was farthest from my thoughts," said the affable manager of Philadelphia Phillies today on being informed he had been named to that honor in the Associated Press' annual poll of sports writers and sportscasters.

"I knew we had a coming ball club, even though we finished a bad sixth in 1948," he said, "but as to myself being selected as the No. 1 manager after so brief a period in major league baseball—well, I just never gave it a thought."

Sawyer, the former college professor who once managed Toronto Maple Leafs, edged Casey Stengel of the world champion New York Yankees. The manager of the National League champs was named on 164 of the 381 ballots. Stengel, who won the honor last year, received 134 votes to finish a close second.

Robert (Red) Rolfe, former coach of the now-defunct Toronto Huskies professional basketball team, who did a great job in directing Detroit Tigers to second place in the American League, was third with 51 votes. Leo Durocher polled 23 for his feat of piloting New York Giants to third position in the National circuit. Steve O'Neill of Boston Red Sox received five and Bucky Harris of Washington Senators, four.

"If the draft doesn't cut too big a hole we should be right in there from the start next year," Sawyer said. "After all, it is a young ball club and should be considerably better with a year more of experience behind it."

The one-time Ithaca College biology teacher was the father confessor, friendly advisor, coach and psychologist to every member of the club.

"Build up a fellow's confidence and you build up his ability," said Sawyer. "Knock him all the time, his confidence disappears and the battle is lost."

Schriner Not Pleased With Team

Filchok Gets Chance To Play Football In U. S.

BALTIMORE, Md., Nov. 8 (CP)—Frank Filchok, who starred with Montreal and Hamilton, Ont., teams during four years exile from United States pro football because he failed to report a bribe attempt, got a chance today to play U. S. football again.

Baltimore Colts of the National Football League signed the 33-year-old backfield player, who just finished a two-year contract with Montreal Alouettes of the Inter-Provincial Rugby Union.

Filchok played with Hamilton Tigers of the Ontario Rugby Football Union for two years prior to his contract with Montreal.

In Montreal, the Alouette management expressed surprise. Low Hayman, Alouette managing director and coach, said he had had no advance word of Filchok's intentions.

Filchok had made no commitments as to whether he would return to Alouettes next fall. Some speculation in Montreal was that Filchok may intend only to finish out the season in the U. S. and listen to contract terms again from Alouettes next year.

"It's mighty good to be back," Filchok said after the signing.

Abe Watner, Colt president, said he gave Filchok a contract primarily "to give Frank another chance to play in this country."

The star forward, punter and quarterback may play Sunday with Colts against Pittsburgh Steelers. After that he'll have opportunities to perform against his old teams, Washington Redskins and New York Giants.

Filchok and Merle Hapes, a Giant teammate, were suspended indefinitely from pro football for not reporting they had been offered a bribe to "throw" the 1946 National League championship playoff game with Chicago Bears. Filchok played in the game and the Bears won. Neither Filchok or Hapes was accused of accepting any money.

The ban on Filchok was lifted last July by N.F.L. Commissioner Bert Bell. The action enabled him to negotiate as a free agent with any N.F.L. club for a job as player or coach.

It appears that advance predictions in this column concerning Tuesday night's clash between Islanders and Moncton Hawks turned out a little sourer than when one considers the final verdict of that game. It was stated that the Hawks were not believed to be in a position yet to overcome the powerful Islanders.

But it didn't turn out that way. The Hawks did win, even though it was by the slimmest of margins—and one is obliged to take his hat off to them for that. They played good hockey, their best performance over Charlottetown ice this season. They bored in all the time, backchecking and taking advantage of every break that came their way.

It is not the intention to try and make amends for being wrong. That was the case, and it might as well be acknowledged in that light. Many of the ardent followers of the Islanders are wondering where all the fire and power went, that was so much a part of the Islanders when they set the whole Big Four circuit agog with ten straight victories. They showed little of it on the ice Tuesday night when they were outscored 1-0. True, Les Colvin in the Hawks' cage was really hot, there is no taking that away from him. But a lot of ragged play and wild shooting around the net on the part of the Islanders certainly made him look even better.

There have been some smart kicks witnessed over local rugby fields here in days gone by, but the general opinion of most fans at yesterday's match between S. D. U. and Abbies at the S. D. U. field, was that Art Perry of Abbies pulled the daddy of them all. Taking the ball out to his own 45-yard line after an unconverted Saints touchdown, the husky Abbie three-quarterback drop-kicked the ball 36 yards away.

The near-200 pound City athlete booted the ball in a perfect spiral that sailed over the cross-bar with plenty of room to spare in probably one of the smartest displays of kicking that has ever been witnessed here. The tough part of the whole thing was, however, that he didn't get any points for his outstanding effort.

Everybody who witnessed the feat were so amazed with the performance, that at first nobody stopped to consider whether it was legal or not, until Abbie coach Gordon Bennett himself expressed his doubts. After considerable friendly debating among referees, coaches and fans, somebody produced a rule book that dispelled any doubt. Although we haven't the exact wording of the rule to quote from, the general ruling is that there can be no official scoring on a kickoff, or a drop-out kick after a non-converted try. Perry's kick came under the latter category.

That is reasonable enough when one stops to think about it. If every time a team scored a try, the opposition were able to score two points on the kickoff (providing such a feat could be accomplished often enough) it would be giving them an advantage they are not entitled to. It would also be putting the scoring team at a disadvantage which in a sense would be penalizing them for scoring.

Before the rule book had been produced, coach A. J. McAdam and members of Saint Dunstan's faculty were so enthused themselves with Perry's performance that they were quite willing to allow the points to count. The gesture was a fine indication of the true sportsmanship that is the backbone of amateur sport.

Saint Dunstan's Scores 12-5 Victory Over Abbies In Exhibition Rugby

Saint Dunstan's University scored a 12-5 victory over the Charlottetown Abbies in a smartly played, exciting exhibition rugby game at the S. D. U. playing field yesterday afternoon.

Scheduled on short notice as strictly a practice session for Abbies in preparation for their forthcoming McCurdy Cup playoff game against Glace Bay Caledonians this Saturday, the game produced one of the keenest sessions to be witnessed here this season.

Four well-earned touchdowns for Saints, garnered by Jerry Clinton, George Cameron, Charlie Cheverie and Joe Mullally, paced the University men to victory, while a brilliant 80-yard run by Bennett MacDonald of Abbies, with Art Perry making good the convert, accounted for the Abbies' five points.

It was a scintillating game that was wide-open and produced plenty in the way of smart ball handling, fast backfield running attacks and long kicking gains, but it was left to Art Perry, husky Abbie three-quarter man, to steal the show for individual effort.

Perry Makes Record Kick

Perry came up with one of the greatest feats of kicking that has probably ever been witnessed over a local rugby field. Following a touchdown by George Cameron of Saints at the twenty minute mark of the first half, unconverted by Cameron himself, Perry took the ball out to his own 45-yard line to drop-kick it over the bar 36 yards away. It was a beautiful spiral kick that went right between the uprights and over the bar with plenty of room to spare. According to the rule book, however, the kicking feat didn't garner any points for the Abbies. The rule book states that a drop-out or kickoff that goes over the bar does not count for points. It is not considered a field goal.

Play was close and open in the first half with both teams coming up with classy running attacks, the Abbies in particular doing smart reverse field passing that gained a lot of territory and came close to paying off in the early stages. Forcing the play into Abbies zone around the ten minute mark, Clinton came up with the first try for Saints at the 13-minute mark.

It was a tricky backfield attack. Joe Mullally reversing his field from Abbies 25-yard line at the right side, passing to Cameron who carried across to get it out to Clinton on the wing who went over on the left corner. Saints went over again seven minutes later to run the score to 6-0. Taking the ball from a scrum on Saints 20, Cameron crashed his way right through centre to down the ball right between the uprights. It was following that score that Perry made his sensational kick.

MacDonald Makes 80 Yard Run

Abbie's three-quarter man, Bennett MacDonald, ended the scoring for the half. Intercepting a pass on his own 25-yard line, MacDonald broke out on a beautiful field-length run right down centre field for one of the smartest efforts to be witnessed here in many a day. Downing the ball right between the goal posts, it gave Perry a straight away kick for the convert and an extra two points, to end the half 6-5 in favor of S. D. U.

Saints showed to much better advantage over their opponents in the final half when they forced the play almost continuously into the Abbegweit sector with smart backfield attacks and rack up two more tries. Staunch defensive work on the part of Abbies kept them from scoring on a number of other occasions.

Three quarters Charlie Cheverie sent the score to 9-5 on a smart attack with Mullally, Cameron and Clinton from about 40 yards out at eight minute mark, while Joe Mullally sent the count to an even dozen in the last minute of play. Mullally fell on a loosely kicked ball that rolled over the Abbie goal line. Cameron missed the convert attempts for all four Saints' tries, most of them from difficult angles.

Suspension Of Conway For 3 Games Announced

HALIFAX, Nov. 8 (CP)—Judge J. Elliott Hudson, Maritime Senior Hockey League president, announced tonight Kevin Conway of League-leading Charlottetown Islanders will be suspended for three games. He also warned "the players in the League to behave themselves or suffer the consequences."

The president's statement said: "Conway has received one misconduct and two match misconduct penalties already this season. Oct. 28 in a game between Charlottetown and Halifax, he was given a misconduct penalty by referee Burton Sleep. Sleep's report stated "Player Conway made threats and threatening gestures to me after the game." I warned Conway that such actions would not be tolerated in the Big Four.

Last night I received the referee's reports on the games of Nov. 3 and 4. The Nov. 3 game was at Moncton and referee George Mallinson's report read: "Players Morrow and Vitale were fighting along the boards and a spectator hit Vitale. Then several Charlottetown players got after the spectator and a general melee started. We gave match misconduct penalties to Duchak and Conway as these two players were the first in to the crowd. Also gave major penalties to Morrow and Vitale."

The Nov. 4 game was at Saint John and referee Stan Swain's report read: "At the 18 minute mark in the third period Charlottetown removed their goalkeeper, and there were several delays in the Saint John zone. I warned the Charlottetown club, that if they were not prepared for the faceoff I would drop the puck, which I did, and a goal resulted. Conway pushed me around so I gave him a match misconduct."
