She was not insured. The cargo, which was insured by William Boyle, Esq., of this city. It consisted of 2088 bush oats; 1334 do potatoes, 840 do turnips, 7 tubs butter, 2 qrs beef, 29 do mutton, 10 geese, 1 barrel beef.

The Tonquin War.

PARIS, Nov. 24. Advice from Tonquin say that as a reprisal for the attack made by the Chinese upon the French gunboats on the 19th inst., while they were revictualing the garrison at Tuyen Quan, General Delisle telegraphs that Colonel Duchesne was sent to attack a force of Black Flags and Chinese regulars entrenched in fortified works near that place. The French force captured the fortifications, the enemy fleeing. The French lost eight men killed and twenty-five wounded. The Chinese have evacuated the Song-Kan valley.

Another Honor to Sir John Macdonald.

LONDON, Nov. 24. Sir Stafford Northcote presided at the Beaconsfield Club to-night, at a dinner given by the Club in honor of Sir John A. Macdonald. Sir Charles Tupper was present.

The Redistribution Bill.

LONDON, Nov. 24. In the House of Commons to-day, Mr. Gladstone gave notice that he hoped to introduce the Redistribution Bill next Monday.

Newfoundland Herring Fishery.

By recent telegrams received from the Bay of Island, Nfld., we learn that the herrings had appeared in the bay in unusual abundance, and that there was every reason to hope for a successful herring fishery. The quality of the herrings taken is equal to that of Labrador herrings; and as there is a great scarcity of the latter, a high price will be obtained for those taken in the Bay of Islands. This is a winter fishery. The herrings take refuge in the deep waters of the bay from the storms of winter. So long as the bay remains open, the herrings are taken in the usual way with nets. When the ice forms holes are cut through which the nets are passed, and the fishery goes on during the entire winter.

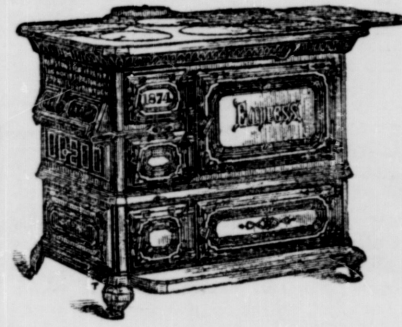
