**Big Upsurge In Fish Landings Reported From Souris Area**

Fish plants at Souris, which had been working less than a day a week in some cases since early in September, are now being flooded with fish. Beginning last week mackerel struck in quantity and inshore boats have been landing very large catches. Some fishermen are doing exceptionally well, it was learned. One man said his take for the week amounted to \$278.

The draggers are also landing large quantities of haddock and flounders. Five boats unloaded here had about enough fish to keep them busy the remainder of the week. Griffin plants unloaded two and the East Pack three, one at night. Some days last week approximately 35,000 pounds of mackerel were landed daily at Naufrage, with even larger quantities at North Lake. The fish is being trucked into Souris where at present it is being salted. Later some may be canned.

So great was the rush of fish that Saturday at Naufrage Paul Gallant, the president of the

Eastern Packing Company donned overalls and went to work loading some 15,000 pounds on a truck for Souris. Four draggers were sailing from Souris last night with another expected to go out today.
