# SIU Reveals Formula For Lakes Peace

MONTREAL (CP) — The Board of Maritime Trustees and the Seafarers' International Union of North America has announced agreement on a formula to ensure labor peace on the Great Lakes. It calls for a regular member of the SIU of Canada to take over as president of the union.

Under the SIU constitution, Executive Vice-President Leonard McLaughlin would take over as president in the near future, on Charles Turner, appointed to succeed Hal C. Banks as union head March 18.

In a joint statement to a press conference in the trustees' Montreal office, Paul Hall, president of the SIU of North America, and Charles Millard, a member of the board of trustees, said immediate steps will be taken to restore the SIU of Canada to constitutional control of its members.

Mr. Millard said Mr. Turner would step down as president in the near future, but would remain associated with the union and trustees. New elections are scheduled to be held in November.

The joint statement also said "all possible steps will be taken to achieve integration of maritime unions in Canada where it is in the interests of union stability."

# PIRATE RADIO READY TO GO

LONDON (CP) — Ottawa-born Simon Day is one of a four-man disc jockey team operating from the pirate radio ship Caroline, scheduled to start regular broadcasts of the English coast next week.

Tests began during the weekend and were heard clearly in London and other areas of southeast England.

(Continued from page 1) say in similar policies in other provinces that stay in the programs. This would not lead to project control or democratic procedure.

"It is hoped that a study of the matter will be made so that each province will know whether or not it is capable of assuming on its own any services now provided under share-out programs. Providing this information would be one of the functions of the federal-provincial tax structure committee that may be set up."

Another matter discussed at the conference was the distribution of mineral rights of the provinces. "We have enjoyed these rights for many years," the Premier said, "and there should be no reason why they should be taken away from us without our having recourse to legal procedure."

"We were promised a study of the whole matter of offshore rights and it is our hope that these rights will be preserved for us."

Premier Shaw suggested that more frequent federal-provincial fiscal conferences are likewise a good idea. "Wherever we went there was a fine spirit of friendliness and refined courtesy extended to us from all sides."

HERE IN FALL

Premier Shaw said the next full meeting of all Canadian premiers and Prime Minister Pearson will take place in Sept. 1 in Charlottetown. "It is likely they all will be here," he said, "to take part in the 100th anniversary celebrations of the Fathers of Confederation meeting."

The Premier said he will be off to Ottawa "in a week or so" to discuss with federal officials a "number of matters of import to the province." He said he would be meeting with public works officials regarding highways and will also meet with the new minister of rural development.

# Social Insurance Number Card It's to help you

Your government is issuing Social Insurance Number Cards in place of the unemployment insurance numbers that most employed people have had until now. The new numbers will help government to use modern office methods for greater efficiency in handling unemployment insurance, and also other social benefits such as proposed pension plans.

For these reasons, you are invited to apply for a Social Insurance Number, even if you are not a contributor to the unemployment insurance plan.

**WHAT YOU DO IF YOU ARE AN EMPLOYEE:**  
Your employer will give you an application form for a Social Insurance Number Card. You can help most by completing it quickly and accurately and returning the form to your employer.

**WHAT YOU DO IF YOU ARE UNEMPLOYED:**  
If you are receiving unemployment insurance benefit you will be asked to apply for a Social Insurance Number Card, the next time you report, in person, or by mail. If you are a person who is usually employed but are not receiving benefit, you should call at the local office of the Unemployment Insurance Commission and register.

**WHAT YOU DO IF YOU ARE AN EMPLOYER:**  
(a) If you are an employer registered with the Unemployment Insurance Commission—you will automatically receive registration forms. You will be asked to distribute them to your employees, have them completed, and returned to the local office of the Commission.  
(b) If you are an employer who is not registered with the Unemployment Insurance Commission—please get in touch with your local Commission office and inform them how many employees you have. The Commission will then send you an application form for each of your employees to complete. When all forms have been completed, you will return them to the Unemployment Insurance Commission.
