Disunity Bewailed In Coal Industry

SYDNEY (CP) — Dosco coal chief Harold Gordon said here Wednesday "it is most unfortunate" that disunity has developed among those seeking to restore the health of the Nova Scotia coal industry. Mr. Gordon said in a statement that "nothing less than the closest co-operation and mutual assistance" was needed between all parties interested in the industry. The Dominion Steel and Coal Corporation vice-president and general manager's statement was his first since he locked horns in Halifax Monday with District 26 United Mine Workers (Ind.) President Bill Marsh.

Reds Organize Service For Testing Of Missiles

PARIS (AP)—The Soviet Union has set up what amounts to a fourth arm in its military forces to manufacture, test and fire a growing family of missiles and their atomic warheads, a NATO publication said Wednesday. Report said the Russians have about 100 principal missile bases. Soviet intercontinental and intermediate-range missiles, capable of carrying atomic warheads, have been operational since July, 1958. A missile with a solid-fuel engine for firing from a submerged submarine already is in service.

Lewis Ends Long Career

WASHINGTON (AP)—John L. Lewis Tuesday announced an end to a long career as a moving force in organized labor. Lewis, hale and hearty at 80, said in an open letter to members of the United Mine Workers union that he will retire as president shortly after the new year. He has held the job for 40 years. Lewis will be succeeded as UMW president by Thomas Kennedy, now vice-president. Like Lewis, he started working in the mines as a teen-ager. Kennedy, 72, has been a union member for 60 years and served as Pennsylvania lieutenant-governor in 1935-39.

Your right hand opponent deals and bids One Diamond, both sides vulnerable. What would you now bid with each of the following five hands?
1. AAKKQ ♠ 88 ♣ 432
2. AAK ♠ 78543 ♠ 768 ♠ A2
3. AAK ♠ 774 ♠ A3E ♠ KQ96
4. AKQJ3 ♠ A4Q95 ♠ 4 ♠ 49742
5. AKQJ9882 ♠ Q94 ♠ 85 ♠ 46

adequate and could result in the loss of a game. Partner would not expect such a good hand. If the ace of hearts were changed to the deuce, we would then have a normal one spade overcall.
2. Pass. The distinguishing feature of an overall is the number of tricks that can reasonably be expected to be taken. Safety is the important factor. Point count takes a secondary role. If a one heart overcall goes doubled, a set of 800 or 1,100 points might easily follow. The suit in which the overall is made should be sturdy. It should contain solid playing tricks.
3. One notrump. Although there is more than ample strength to justify an informative double, the notrump overcall is preferred. This is because a more concise message is delivered by the notrump bid. The balanced distribution, the point count of 16 to 18, and the divided length are all represented by the overall of one notrump. A takeout double, though, can vary widely both as to distribution and point count, and hence gives less precise information.
4. Double. It is far better to double than to overcall with a heart or spade. Rather than a guess which of the three suits would serve best as trump, we double to compel partner to choose the suit. Whichever one he selects is likely to serve as the best trump suit. While we have only 12 high-card points, the value of the hand as a whole will rise appreciably as support for any suit partner names.
5. Three spades. This bid is largely defensive, the purpose the opponents. Although partner is not barred from continuing in spades, he is warned by the preempt not to expect more than a long and fairly solid suit in a hand that is not worth much defensively. A reasonable amount of safety is associated with the preemptive bid. The overcall should have six or seven playing tricks so that, if he gets doubled, nothing disastrous can happen.
