Mr. Laurier's policy for Canada: "I do not believe in Imperial Federation. There is a grander idea yet. "No doubt at this moment it excites alarm, as every such movement excited alarm before the event, but it will be, as other great movements have been, a cause of admiration when it is completed.

"I hold out to my fellow-countrymen the idea of independence. If we are true to our record we will exhibit to the world the unique, the unprecedented, example of a nation achieving its independence by slow degrees and as naturally as the ripe fruit falls from the parent tree.

"The minister of Finance reproached me a moment ago that I had staid in Boston that the Canadian people have interests altogether at variance with the interests of the Mother Country.

"Sir, I said so in Boston, and I say so now on the floor of the House.

"I have again and again repeated that the goal of my aspiration is the independence of Canada—to see Canada an independent nation in due time."—Sir Wilfrid Laurier in Parliament.

This is a Liberal-Conservative view:—

"For my part, I glory in being a British subject.

"When the fortunes of war in this country dragged us from the arms of our old mother country and threw us on to the breast of Albion, the white flag of France recrossed the seas, never to return, and the meteor flag of England took its place.

"Our fathers felt the loss of their old flag, but took their oaths to be faithful to the flag which replaced it.

"Today, in the light of subsequent events in Europe, there is not a thoughtful or studious French-Canadian in this province who does not thank the All-wise Providence for that happy day when the destinies of the French-Canadians came under the flag of Britain, which guarantees to us all our civil and religious liberties in a measure we could never enjoy under any other power.

"The Conservative party has one policy and one banner for all the provinces of the Dominion." (Cheers)

"We do not wish to excite passion among the people; we do not seek to climb to power by treason or prejudice.

"We remain faithful to the glorious banner which protects our liberties, and which we pray will continue to do so for all time to come."—Hon. Thomas Chapuis.

LEUT. MORRISON DESCRIBES THE CALM STRENGTH OF THE HERO OF KHARTOUM.

Leut. Morrison, in the Citizen, gives the following pen picture of the Hero of Khartoum:

"This morning divine service was held, and General Roberts and Lord Kitchener were both there, so I had a good look at them for nearly an hour as they stood out in the middle of the hollow square. 'Bobs' is certainly a wonderful little man for his years. It was very close, and hot, but he stood up the whole service, though any number of men dropped in the ranks. Kitchener gives one the impression of not feeling very much at home as a member of the staff. It may be a mistaken impression and due only to his manner in public, for 'the terrible Sirdar' looks the part in a most satisfactory way. Big, grim and unapproachable-looking, he takes his place always with scrupulous exactitude on the right rear of the field marshal, but well out to the front of the staff. I have never seen him chatting with anyone even when the staff is 'standing easy.' He has nothing of the heavy tragedian air, but you instinctively think of something powerful and calmly ferocious under restraint. To his strong, handsome face, the over-shot forehead gives a lowering appearance and, underneath his deep brows, the eyes look dull and apathetic until they undeceive you with a momentary leonine flash. Though so tall he is

rather heavily built and moves with a deliberateness that would be sluggish were it not for the impression of a tremendous physical strength capable of being gradually roused into irresistible activity. He is the sort of man who would lyddite sixteen thousand of the enemy, light a fresh cigar and lyddite sixteen thousand more without a thought of anything but military expediency and the welfare of the state. He is, in a word, the very antithesis of his small, alert, cheerfully benevolent-looking chief.
