Aaron L. Wins Feature Race On Card As Halifax Racing Gets Underway

HALIFAX, Aug. 29 (CP)—Aaron L., owned by McNeil and McIsaac of Charlottetown, took two out of three heats in the 2 1/2 Trot and Pace today to win the feature event of the opening day's harness racing at the Nova Scotia Exhibition.

The island horse won the first heat by a head in a driving finish but dropped back to third in the second heat, won by Calumet Dudds, from Westphal, N. S. In the third, the Charlottetown gelding stayed out in front all the way.

San Ton, four-year-old gelding owned by F. O. McCurdy of Truro, had little trouble taking all three heats of the 2:23 Trot and Pace, only other event on the program. Squire Hanover, owned by Semple and Alexander of Saint John, N. B., took second place in each heat with James Powers' Miss Victoria from Charlottetown, drawing down two thirds.

As the horses were scoring for the second heat of the 2:23, Byron York, owned by N. Malois of Campbellton, N. S., fell and threw driver Bob Morrison in front of him. Neither horse nor driver were hurt, and they returned for the last heat in which Byron York placed fourth.

Fight Managers Suspended By N. Y. Commission

NEW YORK, Aug. 29 (AP)—Eddie Mead and Al Weill, managers of Henry Armstrong and Lou Ambers, were suspended by the New York State Athletic Commission today for conduct detrimental to boxing, but the athletic fathers turned their backs on the charges. Mead made after last week's lightweight title fight.

The commission announced its meeting, open to newspapermen, was for the purpose of investigating statements Mead made concerning referee Arthur Donovan's actions for the fight, which Ambers won after five rounds were taken from Armstrong for low punching. He presented his charges, among which was one that Donovan was "incompetent and should have his license taken away."

When he was finished, the commission decided there was nothing to them.

In the words of General John J. Pielian, commission chairman, the decision was: "we do not consider them as shown there was any such thing going on."

The two managers were suspended, the commission said, because their antics the night of the fight "created a great disorder."

At various times during the bout, both climbed onto the apron of the ring and exchanged shouted words with Donovan.

Mead was suspended for a year and a month and Weill for four months, but the commissioners then felt they would temper "justice with mercy" and agreed to lift the suspension for 30 days, provided that including the scheduled bout between Armstrong and Ambers for the welterweight title, slated for some time in early November.

Donovan was summoned but was not asked to refute such statements by Mead.

1. That the arbiter "deliberately stood behind Ambers" throughout the fight, "changing every move Armstrong made," which put him in a position where he could not see punches Ambers threw.

2. That Armstrong was not permitted to punch when he backed Ambers into the ropes or in a corner and was swinging with both hands free.

3. Why Donovan's pre-fight instructions, which he sounded, directed Armstrong to "punch in the line tonight the round will be taken away from you."

4. That Donovan was prejudiced against Armstrong.

5. Why motion pictures of the fight showed that questionable punches were delivered in only two of the five rounds taken away from Armstrong.

Elimination Of Kelly Is Upset In Opening Round; Saunders Places Second

HALIFAX, Aug. 29 (CP)—A white-haired physician from Chester, N. S., Dr. P. C. Jarboe, led the way into the championship round of the Maritime Amateur golf tournament on the Ashburn links today after two-wierd rounds which saw the New Brunswick-Prince Edward Island titlist squeeze through the qualifying 36 holes.

The elderly doctor fired a one-over-par 68, best 18-hole score of the day, in the morning round and tacked on a 76 for a total of 144. While he was setting the pace, Pete Kelly of Charlottetown, N. B., F.E.L. Champion and one of the favorites, was floundering around to come home with 87-75-162. Last of the 16 players to enter the championship division, D. V. Rainie of Ashburn, had 160.

Border Team Takes Lead Over Minto

ST. STEPHEN, N. B., Aug. 29 (CP)—St. Stephen edged Minto 9-8 tonight in long, tough 13-inning senior baseball playoff. The border team now leads 2 games to 1 in the best of five series.

Both clubs paraded a string of pitchers in the mound. Minto started for St. Stephen but was replaced in the first by Brownell, who lasted until the fourth. Young Don Norton finished the game in fine style by allowing only two hits. Amble used four hurlers: Taylor, Nichols, Barnett and Moore.

Ontario Shotmaker In Lead

NEW YORK, Aug. 29—Joe Thompson of Hamilton, Ont., showed the way today to 14 scattered Canadians seeking to qualify in various districts for the United States amateur golf championship to be played at Chicago Sept. 11-18.

Thompson put together rounds of 78 and 77 for 155 which placed him among the select 17 in a field of 77 in the metropolitan district test at Mamaroneck, N. Y.

Paul Farley of Toronto captured medalist honors in the sectional eliminations at the Buffalo Country Club as he shot 142 two sub-par 7's.

C. Ross (Sandy) Somerville of London, Ont., as United States amateur champion in 1932, qualified automatically for the tournament. Nine other former champions or champions of their own country, also were entitled to "free" tourney berths.

Only Major Upset

Elimination of the sorrel-topped star from the title play was the only major upset in the qualifying round. The defending champion, Percival Street, of Saint John, N. B., edged in with 79 and 78 for a total of 157.

Lowest New Brunswicker was Bill Crawford of Saint John Westfield, who tied for third with Nip Ross of New Glasgow, N.S. Each had 148. A surprise post-entry, Steele raked up 158 to qualify. Steele flew here from Saint John, played an 81 in the morning and steadied to 77 this afternoon.

Cards Pennant Chances Hurt As Pirates Edge Out St. Louis Team 2-1

NEW YORK, Aug. 29 (AP)—Today's only National League baseball game saw Boston Bees inflict another damaging blow to St. Louis Cardinals' sagging pennant hopes, Casey Stengel's team taking the last game of the series 2-1.

It was the Bees' third victory of the four-game set and it not only dropped the Cards 1-2 games behind the League-leading Cincinnati Reds but also placed them only two games ahead of the on-rushing third-place Chicago Cubs.

The Bees sent young Dick Erickson to the firing line in his second start of the season, and he held St. Louis to eight scattered hits.





Nova-Galento Fight Set Ahead 8 Days


