

Reserved Parking Area Debated At S'side Town Council Monthly Meeting

Further consideration will be given to a request of the Summerside Co-op Super Market for a reserved parking area in front of their store on Water Street for the use of their delivery truck.

This decision was taken at the regular meeting of the Council last evening following the reading of a letter in which he pointed out that a considerable inconvenience would be caused by their delivery men in carrying the parcels by stairway to their rear yard which, he pointed out, was also used as a public parking lot.

Members of the Council expressed the opinion that to grant this concession to one organization would, in effect, obligate them to give the same privilege to any other merchant who requested it.

Councillor Clark took objection to this opinion and said he felt that any place of business should be permitted to have a reserved parking area in front of their property if they were willing to pay what the area would bring in if parking meters were in use in the area.

After considerable discussion the Council adjourned briefly to permit the street committee to examine a recommendation on the matter, and the chairman of the committee, James MacDougall, reported that the majority were not in favor of granting the request at this time.

Meeting again in council, Councillor Clark opposed the recommendation of the committee in regard to the possibility of similar requests from other businesses, said he thought each should be decided on their own merits.

In the vote that followed Councillor Clark was in opposition to the motion which deferred the matter to a later date for further consideration by the council.

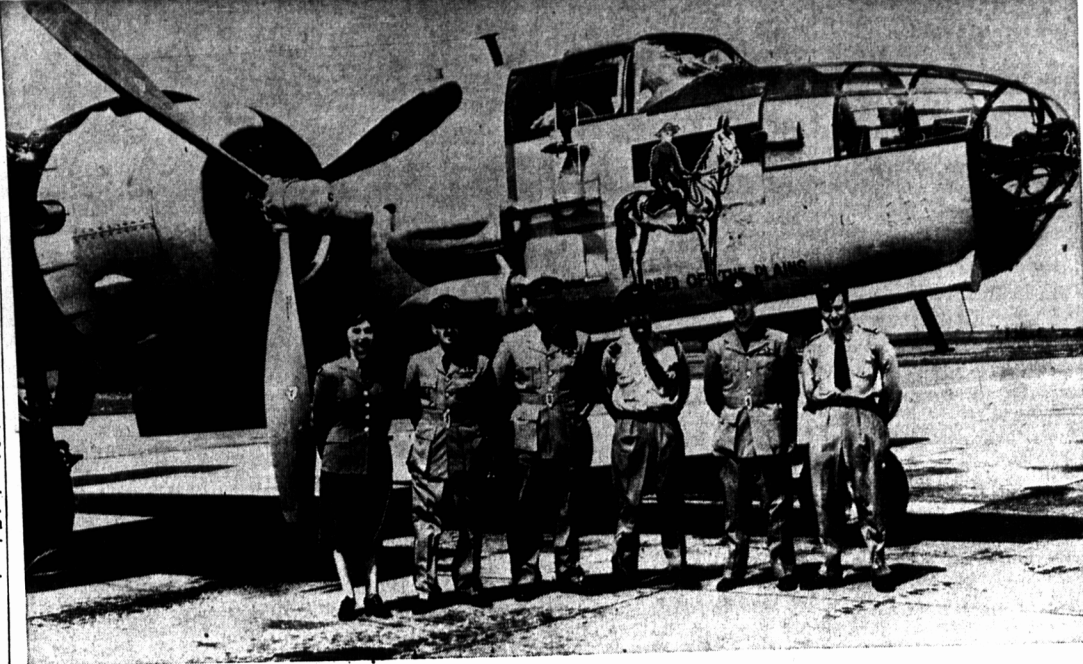

Advance Party Of Sqdn. To Train At S'side

The units represented are the reserve squadrons 418 City of Edmonton, and 406 City of Saskatoon, and 404 City of Regina, who will carry out training in co-operation with army units at Camp Gagetown.

The advance party is made up of regular force personnel attached to the units, and it is making final arrangements for the arrival of the major group over the weekend.

This big operation will air-lift approximately 500 persons with equipment from their western bases to the Summerside station. The first arrivals will take place on Friday and the movement is expected to be completed by Sunday. These tactical units are completely mobile and are capable of moving every person and bit of equipment as the need dictates. A few of the personnel are motoring to the Island with their families and are making the two weeks period a vacation as well as a summer camp.

S'side Prisoner Escapes As Theft Trial Begins

—Wilbert Hippenstall, 27, of Summerside bolted from police court yesterday morning as his trial was about to commence.

Hippenstall, charged with theft, had been arrested by Constable Harry MacKay last Friday in connection with a recent break at the Convent Street Grocery.

To prevent an anticipated attempt to escape, Const. MacKay escorted the prisoner from jail to the police station yesterday morning where custody of the prisoner was assumed by Chief of Police Peter White while Const. MacKay returned two prisoners to the jail following their conviction on drunk charges.

When the charge of theft was read by Magistrate E. H. Strong, Hippenstall pleaded "not guilty" and during a brief interval that followed before commencement of his trial, he made a sudden dash for the door about 10 feet away, pushed several spectators aside that had gathered in the police court to watch the trial, and passed through a small porch entrance, out onto the street, and was last seen as he glanced back for assurance that he was not being pursued as he rounded a hedge and ran through the driveway behind the Federal Building.

The case has necessarily been adjourned.—S.
