**Chicago, Detroit In Biggest Player Swap In History Of N. H. L.**

DETROIT, July 13 (CP) — The biggest trade in the history of the National Hockey League was disclosed today with word that Detroit Red Wings had swapped five of their players for four from Chicago Black Hawks.

Detroit, champions of the N. H. L. and winners of the Stanley Cup last season, turned over to the Hawks goalie Harry Lumley, defencemen Jack Stewart and Al Dewsbury, left winger Pete Bando and centre Don Morrison.

In exchange they got centre Metro Prystal, left winger Gaye Stewart, defenceman Bob Goldnam and goalie Jim Henry.

The deal should strengthen Detroit's offensive power and improve Chicago's defence.

In Lumley the Hawks obtain one of the best goalies in the business. He gave up an average of only 2.35 goals a game last season.

Prystal, a native of Yorkton, Sask., gives the Wings what they need most—a young, first class centre. Now 22, he led Chicago in goals last season with 29 and was the League's fourth best. His last amateur club was the Moose Jaw Canucks.

Winnipeg-born Terry Sawchuk, star goalie for the Wings' Indianapolis farm club, has been considered ready for some time to move

It was announced at the meeting that the Club would endeavour to secure the services of Nick Metz, former playing star of Toronto Maple Leafs of the National Hockey League, who is at present in Saskatoon, Saskatchewan, as coach of the Charlottetown Club. It is understood that Metz is available for coaching duties, and it is the intention of the executive to contact him immediately. Although no definite decision has been reached regarding the naming of the team, "The Islanders" was one that was strongly proposed by the meeting.

**Bill Durnan Decides To Quit Job As Goalie**

MONTREAL, July 13 (CP) — Bill Durnan, one of the greatest goal-keepers in hockey history, has decided to hang up his pads after seven National Hockey League seasons.

The big Montreal Canadiens player, six times Vezina Trophy winner as the league's best goalie, Wednesday walked into the office of Frank Seike, Canadiens' general manager, and said "this is it."

"I could never stand another season," the 35-year-old Toronto native said. "My nerves are all shot and I know it."

Succeeding Durnan in the Habits next season will be 23-year-old Gerry McNeil, called up from Cincinnati Mohawks of the American Hockey League during Stanley Cup play last year.

At that time, Durnan, ill and unwell, asked to be replaced.

Today, Seike said the job as Canadiens netminder is all McNeil's. "Anyone who thinks he can get it away from him will have to do it fighting the hard way," he said.

First news of Durnan's retirement came last February when he said: "If there's a decent business opportunity I am certain to take it and leave hockey."

Shortly after he was seriously injured in a game at Chicago when he fell on a skate and nearly lost his sight. He returned to play for the remainder of the season until the Cup playoffs.

Durnan came to Canadiens in the 1934-44 season. Since then he has been named to the League's all-star team six times.

During his N.H.L. career, Durnan played in 300 games and had 901 goals scored against him for an average of 2.34.

**Williams May Play Again This Season**

BOSTON, July 13 (AP) — Ted Williams, Boston Red Sox' \$125,000 slugger, tonight was given some chance of playing again this season by the surgeons who removed seven bone fragments from his left elbow earlier in the day.

Williams was reported "resting comfortably" in hospital after a 75-minute operation that Dr. Joseph Shortell and Dr. Ralph McCarthy described as "very successful."

Dr. Shortell, an orthopedic specialist, expressed confidence that Williams, baseball's highest-salaried performer, not only would recover full use of his left arm but also would be able to play again. But he declined to estimate the time he will be sidelined.

Dr. McCarthy, the club's regular physician, gave a more encouraging report.

"We do not anticipate a second operation," he said. "It will be several weeks before Ted regains the normal motion of his arm. We hope he will be ready to play again before the end of this season."

Williams injured his arm in the first inning of Tuesday's all-star game in Chicago when he ran into the fence after catching a fly ball.

Dr. McCarthy displayed the bone fragments, the largest of which was the size and shape of a dime coin, as he marvelled over Williams' ability to withstand severe pain. From the time Williams suffered the injury until it was x-rayed yesterday, the arm had swollen to twice its normal size.

**Horse Loses Purse In Protest**

NEW YORK, July 13 (AP) — The \$36,350 purse won by the Maine Chance Farm's juvenile colt, win or lose, in yesterday's East View Stakes at Jamaica will be taken from the winner and awarded the second horse on a protest, it was learned tonight.

The second horse in the six-furlong dash was Nullify, trained by the Phantom Farms stable of Walter Fletcher.

Francis P. Dunne, steward representing the New York State Racing Commission, said the protest was lodged by Nullify's trainer, J. C. Lawrence. The trainer claimed the colt should have carried 122 pounds instead of 117 under the race conditions and the commission agreed an error had been made.

Between seventy and seventy-five entries are expected to come down behind the starting gate to battle it out over the mile distance during the night's events, while tomorrow night some sixty or more will see action in a total of nine, one-mile dash features.

**Louis May Fight Charles In September**

NEW YORK, July 13 (AP) — The possibility of September championship fights between Joe Louis and Ezzard Charles and Jake LaMotta and Sugar Ray Robinson had the boys buzzing along cauliflower row today.

Jim Norris, president of the International Boxing Club, said that Louis would come out of retirement to oppose Charles in September if he could straighten out his tax problems with Washington.

The promoter said if everything worked out right, LaMotta might defend his middleweight title against Sugar Ray in the first week of September. Louis and Charles would be ticketed for the last week in September.

Louis' comeback, Norris said, hinges on the Bomber's negotiations with the Internal Revenue Department.

The retired heavyweight champion owes the Government "a considerable sum of money," said Norris. "The only way he can ever pay it and get straightened out is to fight again."

"He has asked the Government to accept whatever his purse would be for a Charles fight in full settlement of the Government's claim," said Norris. "That would hold whether the purse amounted to more than what he owed or if it was less."

Louis got into his tax difficulties a couple of years ago, Norris explained. "His auditors and counsel advised him to make certain deductions and he did. The Government disallowed these deductions. So now he owes the money."

**U.K. Minister Warns Boxing Sadistic**

LONDON, July 13 (Reuters) — Dr. Edith Summerskill, sharp-tongued National Insurance Minister, has hit out at boxing matches and war movies as "uncivilized" and "sadistic" influences on British youth.

She warned women at a labor party gathering against allowing their boys to see boxing matches or listen to broadcasts of them.

The recent top-flight heavyweight match between Britain's Bruce Woodcock and Lee Savold of New Jersey, for instance, she described as "not amusing nor instructive, but only brutalizing to those who saw it or listened to."

Savold won it.

Tackling producers of war movies on the same ground, Dr. Summerskill said they "appeal to the sadistic impulses of man and thus helped to play their awful part in promoting war."

CHICAGO, July 13 (AP) — Bill Voiselle, Chicago Cubs right-hander, today was optioned to Springfield Cubs subject to a 24-hour recall. Springfield is the Cubs' farm in the International League.

Voiselle, who came to the Cubs from Boston Braves last year, had won none and lost four this season.

**Macken, Main In Tennis Singles Today Against Australia's Top Stars**

MONTREAL, July 13 (CP) — Canada's Brendan Macken and Lorne Main today drew starting assignments in tomorrow's opening singles tennis matches of the North American Davis Cup tie against the confident Australians.

The draw sends Montreal's Macken against Frank Sedgman in the first match and Main of Vancouver against Ken McGregor, 21-year-old rookie member of the Australian team.

The Australian singles pair are even money choices in light betting not to drop a set.

Harry Hopman, captain of the Australian squad, predicted this afternoon that his team is "certain to win."

"Despite the noticeable improvement of both Macken and Main," he said, "we will take the four singles matches."

Hopman announced that his doubles pairing for Saturday's match will be Jack Bromwich, 31-year-old Davis Cup veteran, and Sedgman.

Henri Rochon, Canada's No. 1 ranking player, and 31-year-old George Robinson of Montreal will likely see action in doubles, but this is not definite. Canada's Captain Gordie MacNeil said he did not plan to announce his choice until after Friday's singles games.

**Canadian Golf Tourney Opens On Saturday**

SASKATOON, July 13 (CP) — The carpenters and golfers finished all square today in the opening skirmishes for the Canadian amateur golf championship.

The carpenters took over for last-minute alterations inside the clubhouse and the golfers tried in practice rounds to take down an extremely tough par 70 on the 6,681-yard course at the Saskatoon Golf and Country Club.

There was little talk yet of the Canadian amateur proper. Attention was on the provincial team matches and the Canadian junior championship, both scheduled for Saturday.

Four provincial delegations were still missing late today—Manitoba, New Brunswick, Nova Scotia and Alberta.

One of the early practice-round starters was 17-year-old Laurie Roland from Vancouver's Marine Drive Club. Laurie missed winning the Canadian junior title last year at Saint John, N. B., when he blew sky-high on the last hole for a fat seven.

"There won't be any Saint John this time," said Laurie. "I'll be somewhere around there when this thing is finished."

Roland, about the best bet to succeed Bob Hall of Montreal, who graduated from junior ranks this year, teed off a few minutes behind Nick Weslock, the sharp-shooter of the Ontario team.

Weslock himself is reckoned a likely successor to the amateur title won by Dick Chapman of Oxterville, Mass., last year. Chapman is not defending the title, so far as is known.

With Weslock heading the Ontario field, the guessing is that Ontario will retain the team title won at Saint John last year, although Bill Mahwinney of Vancouver heads up a strong British Columbia bid.

Bob Hall, whose 158 beat Roland by three strokes in the Canadian junior last year, is the youngest member of a darkhorse Quebec team. The 20-year-old McGill University student can cause a lot of confusion before this tournament is over.

The layout of the Saskatoon Golf and Country Club is a tight, compact course cut smack in half by railroad tracks.

The longest hole is the 517-yard par five 16th, a slight dog's leg, where a birdie won't be too tough for the better golfers.

But they and the others will find plenty of trouble at the third, a par-four 450-yard challenge that calls for an extremely-accurate approach shot with a prayer that the prevailing wind will help.

**Voss Named N.H.L. Referee-In-Chief**

MONTREAL, July 13 (CP) — The National Hockey League announced tonight that it has re-established the position of referee-in-chief, with Carl Voss, former N.H.L. star and president of the United States Hockey League, appointed to the post.

Frank (King) Clancy, veteran player and referee resigned from the job last year to become coach of Cincinnati in American Hockey League.

N.H.L. president Clarence Campbell said "Voss will be in complete charge of the officials including both referees and linesmen in the forthcoming season and will be responsible for their selection, training, assignments and general supervision."

Former referees-in-chief during the last 25 years include Gopet Smeaton, Frank Patrick, Bill Stewart and Mickey Tor.

Voss, U. S. H. L. president last season, played with nearly every N.H.L. club during his 10 years with the loop.

**London Gives Barbara Ann Big Reception**

LONDON, July 13 (CP) — Britain gave an enthusiastic reception tonight to "Rose Marie On Ice," an operetta with Quebec and Alberta as a background and starring two of Canada's greatest skaters.

Six thousand fans at Harringay Arena cheered as Ottawa's Barbara Ann Scott and Michael Kirby of Toronto, skated the principle roles in the opening performance of a show that will run for two months.

Barbara Ann, who as an amateur won five world championships, is to draw £2,500 (\$7,750) a week for Rose Marie—about £3 a minute every time she hits the ice against backdrops representing the Canadian Rockies and the backwoods of Quebec.

Other Canadians in the cast of 200 include Adrian (Pete) Ballinger of Quebec, Gerry Rowse of Winnipeg and Don Mann of Montreal.
