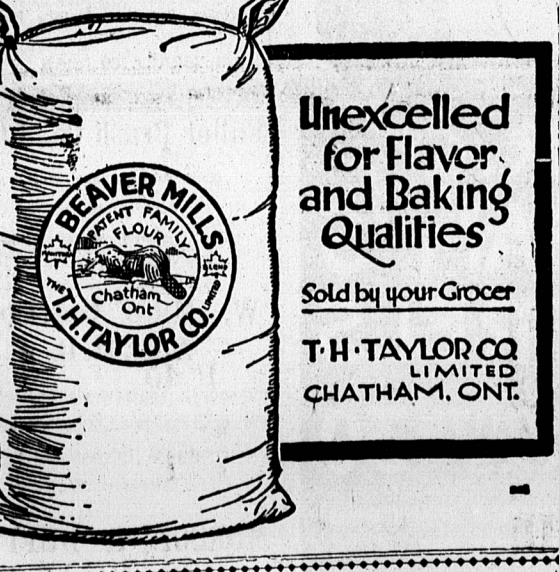

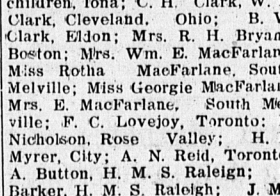

Berlin Under Martial Law

LONDON, June 26.—Dr. Rathenau's assassination rejuvenated rumors of the possibility of a reactionary revolt according to news despatches from Berlin received here today. The measure is particularly significant taken in connection with the rumors from Copenhagen that martial law had been declared in Berlin. It is very possible that the censorship would prevent the news of the fact from becoming known for several hours.

CO-OPERATIVE SHIPPING OF LIVE FOWL

The season is now approaching when it is best to dispose of the old fowl and chickens. Ceased laying and which are no longer profitable. The Department of Agriculture, Live Stock Branch, is assisting in co-operative shipments of live fowl in car lots as was done last year and a number of sections of the Island are already preparing to ship. If plans have not already been made in a district where it is desired to dispose of the old hens in this way, it would be well to start making preparations. It takes from three to three thousand, five hundred birds to fill a car. This means that in most cases two or three Circles or Institutes will have to ship together. It is, therefore, necessary, that each Circle prepare a list of the approximate number of fowl and the names of the persons desiring to ship co-operatively, so that it will be known at what stations loading will take place and when to order the Special Poultry Car.

The market for fowl is not as good this year as last. In addition American exchange is almost at par and not nearly so favorable for shipping as last year. Nevertheless the market should return a price of 15c a pound, live weight, or a little better, possibly as high as 18c, depending on shrinkage, the quality of the fowl and other factors. While this price is not as good as some would like, nevertheless it is better than keeping chickens which have become unprofitable, and which are no longer producing. These are better disposed of at any price. In any case by shipping co-operatively the shipper will obtain all that the fowl will bring on the best markets available.

The United States Senate is preparing a high tariff on poultry and poultry products, which is liable to come into effect very shortly. It is therefore advisable to get these shipments away as soon as possible, preferably during July and August, as prices are higher then, than later in the season. As soon as the American tariff comes into effect, the market for poultry will be largely shut off from that market and unless a considerable stock is shipped while the opportunity remains, prices are apt to be extremely low this fall.
