# BREAD WARFARE

ST. MARYS, Ohio (AP) - A bread price war between two supermarkets reached a climax Friday. The staff of life was selling for a penny a loaf. The rock-bottom price for 20-ounce loaf of white bread, which normally retails at 21 cents, was reached after four weeks of alternate price slashing to uphold each store's boast: "We will not be undersold." There was a 10-loaf limit per customer.

# Deplores Tariff Against Canadian Potato Growers

Speaking last night before a meeting of party workers in this City Mr. George Hees, M.P., President of the National Association of the Progressive Conservative Party deplored the existing tariff agreements between Canada and the United States in so far as they apply to the potato trade. Said Mr. Hees: "The Canadian Government should protest strongly to the U. S. Government regarding the tariff against Canadian potatoes entering the United States, in view of the fact that U. S. potatoes can enter this country free of duty."

"It is only fair and reasonable that Canadian potatoes be allowed duty free into the U. S. A. If that is done I feel sure that the high quality of Canadian and especially Prince Edward Island potatoes will enable our potato producer to acquire an additional market for their product."

The speaker said he found it hard to understand why the Canadian Government can be content to sit idly by and see a completely unfair situation exist regarding the tariffs between the two countries.

"It is further evidence," he said, "of the spineless attitude at Ottawa with regard to standing up for the rights of Canadian producers, and of our Government's willingness to submit to unfair conditions imposed upon our producers when the United States brings pressure to bear on their Government."

Mr. Hees stated that another situation which is particularly unfair to Canadian potato producers is that many growers are allowed to truck their potatoes across the border free of duty, and then ship them at preferential rates to Montreal, Toronto and other Central Canadian points.

# Discussed Problem Of Seasonal Unemployment

Every effort to cut down the amount of seasonal unemployment, which reaches its highest peak in the Atlantic Provinces in the winter months, should be continued, the Regional Employment Committee has decided here yesterday as it wound up its two day quarterly session.

While admitting that due to our climate the seasonality of much employment would always be with us, the committee felt that the co-operation of industry, business and government could do much to shave off some of the peaks and keep more people working in the winter time. They felt that by getting employers in seasonal industries to spread their employment, when possible, over a greater period of the year much good could be attained. This would apply particularly to the construction industry. This was worked on last year with results and the committee felt that a continuation of the methods used last year would be still more beneficial this year.

**FULL EMPLOYMENT**  
In speaking of the current employment, situation W.M. Roberts, the secretary of the committee and the Regional Employment Officer, said that there was practically full employment in the Atlantic Region at this time and in fact there was a considerable shortage of skilled workers such as bricklayers, electricians, plumbers and other construction tradesmen.

He said that the commissions movements of labour had been very successful this year. There had been 1000 sent to Maine for bean harvesting; about 6000 to the United States potato fields, more than 1500 into the New Brunswick and P.E.I. Island potato areas; 500 to Ontario harvests. In addition there had been successful in finding jobs for about 150 displaced Cape Breton miners in the hard rock projects in Quebec and had supplied the construction projects at Camp Gagetown with about 4000 men.

Another scheme now being worked on is the finding of clerical jobs for male and female High School students of Cape Breton in the Toronto area. Due to the fact that Cape Breton is mainly a heavy industry area the general opportunities for light work have to be sought elsewhere.

The committee also endorsed the recommendation of the Saint John employment committee that an aerial survey be made in Southern New Brunswick to provide impetus for mineral prospecting in that part of the province.

It was decided that the next meeting would be held in Fredericton in November.

# Dr. Solandt Leaves Dept. National Defence For Job With C.N. Railway

OTTAWA (CP) - Quiet-spoken Dr. O. M. Solandt, 46, Canada's chief defence scientist for the last eight years, is leaving the defence department to join Canadian National Railways as assistant vice-president in charge of research and development. The defence department announced Friday that he will be succeeded next March 1 as chairman of the defence research board, a native of Hamilton. No reason was given for his departure but it has been known for some time that he wanted to make a move. He set up the defence research board in 1947 and has headed it ever since. It is understood that Winnipeg-born Dr. Solandt will become CNR vice-president on retirement of S. W. Fairweather in 1957. The CNR's salary will be. As chairman of DRB, he has received \$17,500 a year. Dr. Solandt is a medical graduate of the University of Toronto. In 1940 and 1941, during the Battle of Britain, he was director of the southwest London blood supply depot. He later moved into a new branch of the armed forces known as operational research, which attempts to devise new weapons systems and to fit the fighting man to them. He held the rank of colonel in the Canadian Army. He probably knows more about nuclear weapons than any other Canadian. Mr. Zimmerman, a mining engineer and geologist, was director of arms production and later of munitions production in the Second World War. In March, 1951 he was loaned by his firm, Moore Corporation of Toronto, to the defence production department. From early 1952 until this year

SAINT JOHN, N. B. (CP) - The first congress of the Maritime provinces synod, Presbyterian Church in Canada, opened in the church of St. John and St. Stephen here Friday night with about 300 delegates present from the Atlantic provinces.

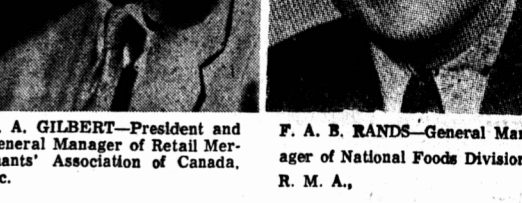
A government shuffle has been confidently predicted. Originally expected in the third week of September, it now is thought likely to be delayed until final decisions are reached on economic and defence problems.

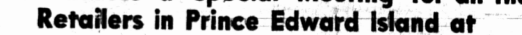
