HORSE AND BUGGY—A FIRST-CLASS TURN-OUT—TO HIRE AT THE NORTH STAR.—sep 1 tf

The Chinese tax bill, passed by the British Columbian Legislature has been disallowed by the Governor General.

A little boy named Jerry Cummings was arrested by the police for stealing in the market to-day. He will be examined to-morrow.

A Californian named Denis Collins has arrived at New York from San Francisco. He walked this distance in ninety-five days, and won a wager of \$,500.

The brig *Peerless*, owned and sailed by Capt. Douse, arrived at this port from Liverpool last night with a cargo of merchandize and salt.

The *Labrador* at New York from Europe on Wednesday, brought one million in gold bars and three hundred thousand in French gold coin.

At the meeting of the Licensing Board held last evening, W. J. Fraser, Esq., was elected chairman. There being no applications for licenses, the Board adjourned till the 22d inst.

The Valleyfield meeting resulted in the passing of a resolution unanimously condemning Mr. Anear's vote on the abolition of the Legislative Council.

SOME of the British Liberal journals fear that the Beaconsfield Government propose annexing New Guinea, which lies north of Australia, to the British Empire.

MR. ROBERT STEPHENSON, of Rustico, had a quantity of oatmeal on sale at the Market to-day, which was ground from white oats of this season's growth.

THE time has now arrived when the dishonest youth goes abroad into the Common and Royalty foraging among the orchards. Warrants have been issued for a number of the foragers.

THE N. Y. *Herald* publishes an Auburn, N. Y., despatch announcing that Hanlan and Courtney have accepted the Rochester offer to row for \$6,000. It also publishes a Toronto despatch stating that Hanlan insists upon his conditions before agreeing to row.

THE Toronto *Telegram* deserves great credit for the original manner in which it can manufacture an original sensation of the most simple material. Given a Senator Brown and a Mr. Jaffray, and that is quite enough; the mysterious night drive, the desperate resistance, the secret political organization and startling developments follow as a matter of course. NOTWITHSTANDING the storm and rain a very fair audience assembled at the Christian meeting house last evening to hear the subject of baptism discussed by Mr. R. B. Neal. Though a muchly discussed subject in our community the people have not lost their interest in it. Mr. Neal's plan of presenting it was novel and interesting. After stating the different theories as to the action, subject and design, he assumed that an intelligent, earnest, honest man who had never heard the word "baptize" with an open Bible in his hand would come to safe and correct conclusions. The natural conclusions of such a man would be—first, in baptism preacher and candidate "both went down into the water," that the candidate was "buried by baptism and raised up again" and came up "out of the water" and walked in "newness of life"; second, that "penitent believers," "both men and women," are the subjects; third, that the design of baptism is "for the remission of sins." Opportunity for objection to these conclusions was given to any one in the audience. There were none offered. Mr. Neal will conclude his labors in our midst this evening. His theme will be "The Perfect Law of Liberty." We trust a large audience will greet him. The community is most cordially invited.—*Com.*
