MEETING IN THE LYCEUM.

upheld at the polls on election day, and in conclusion proposed three cheers for the candidates, which were right heartily given.

Senator Ferguson was also heartily welcomed, pointed out the Farquharson's manifesto abounded in misrepresentations, starting with one regarding vacancies in the Legislature. The Government were endeavoring to detract from their own record by calling attention to the alleged wrong-doings of dead and gone administrations; they were evidently afraid of having their own actions analysed. He defended the withdrawal from the capital of \$200,000, pointing out that the rate of interest was high at the time and that the provision was only of a temporary character. The Liberals promised to make revenue and expenditure meet and kept the promise by increasing the public debt nearly \$500,000. They promised that taxes would not be imposed and proceeded forthwith to impose them. They had also promised a snug sum from Ottawa as the outcome of arbitration of our claims, but neither arbitration nor money was forthcoming. There was nothing to show that arbitration was to be held. They were now endeavoring to obtain a snap verdict. But the Conservatives had good men and true in every constituency, and the prospects were good for carrying a majority of the seats.

Mr J P Tanton, who made an eloquent speech, pointed out in opening that it was for the electors to pass judgment upon the present government for what they had done rather than to judge the acts of their predecessors in office. The honesty and integrity of the men who represent us should be the main consideration. The men who haven't lived up to their pretensions should be turned out. The present Government should be dismissed from office as they had not kept their promises. They had piled up debt in the face of their promised retrenchment, they had given us deficits instead of having revenue and expenditure meet. Do not be discouraged by the last defeat, or the counting out of Mr Martin. Rally round the standard of Paton and Jenkins and elect them on Wednesday next.

Mr Martin, who spoke next, was also given a rousing reception. He urged the people to do all in their power to overthrow the Farquharson administration. He warned the electors against the pretension of Premier Farquharson that something was to be expected from Ottawa. Nothing was to be expected from that source, and he proved this by quoting from the reply of Sir Wilfrid Laurier to the delegates from this province. Mr Martin also reviewed the late contest in East Queen's and his counting out before Judge Macdonald. Every means had been used to defeat him. The desired object had been attained by disfranchising the people at several polls. The people knew of the rejection of the ballots cast at Murray Harbor North poll, and of the late opening of the Glebe William poll and the finding of extra ballots in the box. There was a small supply of ballots at the Rustico poll and 19 or 20 of his supporters were thus prevented from exercising the right to vote.

Mr. W. S. Stewart followed, and was given a hearty welcome. He pointed out that the men who have ruled this province for the past nine years were actuated by motives more or less selfish. Premier Farquharson, for instance, fed at the Dominion trough to the tune of \$25 a day for his tug-boat, and his sons fed at the Provincial trough through the medium of supplies furnished the Hospital for the Insane. The late representative of Charlottetown, Mr Rogers, had in the same way fed at the Dominion and Provincial

troughs; and when Mr. Prowse wished to sell carpets to the Provincial Government he did so through the hardware firm of Fennell & Chandler. Mr. H. J. Palmer, one of the candidates for Fort Augustus, had also fed at the Dominion trough. He had drawn large sums of money as "smelling commiseration," including \$3 a day for boarding himself at his own home. How can Premier Farquharson press our claims upon the Dominion satisfactorily when he is not independent of the Laurier Government? Mr. Stewart then spoke of Sir Louis Davies coming here to help Farquharson, to repay the latter for what he had done in the recent election, and closed with an eloquent appeal for good government and support for Paton and Jenkins.

Dr. Macneil followed, criticising the Farquharson Administration. He deprecated the idea of the claims of the province being better advocated by friends of the party in power, and put in an eloquent plea for justice. If the people were true to themselves on election day they would vote out the administration that had proved false to principle, the men who had not carried out the wishes of the people.

Messrs. E. Gallant and J T Mellich, the candidates for the West River district, each made short addresses. Both gave encouraging reports from their districts. The meetings so far held had been favorable to them.

The meeting closed with rousing cheers for the candidates.

SUNDAY SCHOOL ASSOCIATION AT CA DIGAN.

The second meeting of the Georgetown District Sunday School Convention was held in the Presbyterian church, Cardigan, on Tuesday, the 4th inst., holding an afternoon and an evening session. Rev W H Warren, president, occupied the chair and conducted devotional exercises. The following clergy men connected with the district were present:—Rev Adam Gunn, Cardigan; Rev G N Stevenson, Montague; Rev K Heenan, Georgetown; Rev W H Spencer; and Rev W H Warren, Montague; and Rev G P Raymond, Provincial Field Secretary.

Of the nineteen Sunday Schools in the district, ten were represented as follows:—St Andrew's Presbytery, Cardigan—Mrs (Rev) Dunn, D C Morson. Iona Presbytery—A G Crawford, Mrs Docherty. Martindale Presbytery—Jas Gillis, Mrs Martin. Lorne Valley Presbytery—A McLeod, Miss Nicholson. Georgetown Presbytery—W McConnell. Montague Presbytery—Wallace Campbell.

Montague (Christian)—R. J. Stewart. Montague (Baptist)—N. J. McDonald. Montague (Methodist)—D. A. Martin, Novella Martin, Mary Lemont. Union Road (Methodist)—Dan Ross. The large attendance of delegates and friends present evinced a good degree of interest in S. S. work, and showed how faithfully the efficient secretary, Miss Arabella Robertson, Montague, had been in notifying the schools. An admirable choir, added much to the pleasure of the occasion.

A carefully prepared paper, on "The Qualifications of S. S. Teachers" was read by Rev. G M Stevinson. Christ was shown to be the model teacher, and some of the leading characteristics of His method and spirit were indicated. He put himself on a level with those whom he taught. He exemplified His teaching by His life. He dared to be free and untrammelled in the presentation of His doctrines. He was thoroughly acquainted with the Scriptures. Besides possessing these qualities the teacher should thoroughly understand his pupils and have much patience and helpfulness in doing his work. A lively and appreciative discussion followed the reading of this excellent paper.

A large gathering attended the evening session. The committee on constitution reported, presenting a draft of constitution for the use of the Association. The matter was left for further consideration at the next regular meeting of the body.

Rev A W K Heraman read a thoughtful paper on "Right Use of Lesson Helps." He deprecated the substitution of any helps for the Bible in the School, and urged the proper use of these in the preparation of lessons at home. Even there they should be used merely as aids to clearer Biblical truth and to the stimulation of independent thought. The paper was well received and warmly discussed.

A most interesting paper was read by Mrs. W. H. Spencer, on "How can we secure better attendance and a more efficient school?" It was shown that much of the success of the school depends upon the tact and perseverance of the Superintendent, who should endeavor to attend these associational gatherings for the attainment of new and helpful hints in connection with his duties. Teachers should earnestly co-operate with their superintendents in making the schools efficient. Scholars also should do all in their power, by regular attendance, good conduct, and diligent study, to show their appreciation of the efforts put forth in their behalf. Parents should inspire both pupils and teachers by their own presence in the school, and by their cordial assistance in the preparation of lessons at home. The writer urged that all our schools should be continued in active work throughout the year, and that earnest prayer should be offered in their behalf.

D Scharman, Esq., Superintendent of the Home Department of the province, read a paper, making clear the nature and benefits of the Home Department movement. This is a new department in School work and is rapidly growing in popular favor. It is practically the systematic use of home influence and aid in Bible study.

Much valuable help was afforded by Rev G P Raymond, in reading both sessions interesting and profitable. In his capacity as Field Secretary, he imparted helpful information regarding the latest and most successful methods of Sunday School instruction. He spoke encouragingly of the progress of Sunday School work in P. E. Island, and pointed out lines of improvement which should be pursued. He gave very clear outlines of the methods of normal study, and sought to inspire all present with great zeal in their work.

A hearty vote of thanks was tendered to the pastor, members, and choir of the Cardigan Presbyterian Church for their assistance in making the sessions enjoyable, after which the Association was adjourned to meet at Georgetown on Thursday, March 11th, 1901.
