THE APPEAL CASE.—Appeals from the judgment of the Supreme Court of P. E. Island, setting aside the award of the Commissioners under the Land Purchase Act of 1875, came up before Chief Justice Richards, of the Supreme Court, last week. He granted an extension of time to enable Counsel to prepare the case.

MUSKEL MED DIGGING is a comparatively recent business. At first it was raised with the hand fork and scow'd ashore. Now the modern digger and the horse do the work lighter and the man. Between Point Prim and Wood Islands there are 20 diggers now in active operation; there are 30 on Vernon River, and 55 on Pownal Bay. There are probably between 10 and 12 on Orwell River. It is estimated that 500 loads are raised daily at Pownal, which will mature 27 acres of ground. On Tedeque Bay we have heard that 150 loads may be seen daily at the same time on the way to the land.—Put.

The entertainment at St. Patrick's Hall, in the evening, was the crowning act of the time-honored celebration. Mrs. Maurice Blake, the Misses Rankin and McEwen, Professor Cayen, Doctor Creamer, and Charles Hermans, were among the vocalists, and we need not say, that the music was excellent. Miss Newbery, Miss McEwen, and Mr. Blanchard, of St. Dunstan's College, played the accompaniments upon the Piano. Mrs. Robinson read "Shamus O'Brien" with good effect. The dramatic part of the entertainment was contributed by the boys of St. Joseph's Society. They seemed to bear in mind the old couplet,

PROVINCIAL LEGISLATURE.

HOUSE OF ASSEMBLY. Thursday, March 16, 1876.

The Legislature, which had been prorogued on the 14th day of April, 1875, and thence, from time to time, to the 16th of March, 1876, met this day, at three o'clock p. m., for the despatch of business.

A message from His Honor the Lieutenant-Governor, by Henry Palmer, Esq., usher of the Black Rod, was received, commanding the House to attend immediately in the Chamber of the Legislative Council.

Accordingly, Mr. Speaker, with the House, waited upon His Honor.

Mr. Speaker introduced a Bill relating to Justices of the Peace, which was received, read a first time, and ordered to be read a second time to-morrow.

—FRENCH FROM THE THRONE. Mr. SPEAKER reported that the House had this day appointed His Honor the Lieutenant-Governor, in the Legislative Council Chamber, and that His Honor was pleased to make a speech to both Houses of the Legislature, a copy of which he had, for greater accuracy, obtained—as follows:

Mr. President and Honorable Gentlemen of the Legislative Council: Mr. Speaker and Gentlemen of the House of Assembly.

It affords me great satisfaction to meet you, and to have a chance to your advice and assistance in reference to the public affairs of the province.

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think, with your Honor, that we have much cause for gratitude to Divine Providence, and there can be no doubt that the success which has attended the efforts of those engaged in agricultural pursuits will stimulate them to renewed exertions and lead to increased prosperity.

We are much gratified to learn that the estates of all the principal proprietors have been adjudicated upon, under the provisions of the Land Purchase Act, 1875. We hope the legal questions arising out of the proceedings of the commissioners, may soon be decided; and the subject of land tenure, which has greatly retarded the development of the agricultural interests of this province, may be forever set at rest. When the papers explanatory of the proceedings under the Act alluded to, and the Bill ancillary to it, shall be submitted to us, they will receive our earnest consideration.

The Bill we submitted to us, providing for the registration of persons entitled to vote at elections for members to serve in the general assembly, will have our careful attention.

When the public accounts for the past, and the estimates for the present year are laid before us, the former will be carefully examined by us, and the latter will be provided for with regard to economy and the public requirements.

That the provincial railway has been opened for traffic, and that the people appreciate its advantages is a matter for congratulation. It is satisfactory to learn that the claim of the contractors for damages alleged to have been sustained by them, has been favorably disposed of by arbitration.

We are pleased to know that the building erected in Charlottetown for the use of the law courts, gives increased accommodation.

We thank your Honor for the assurance of your co-operation in the discharge of our legislative duties, and we earnestly desire that the result of our labors may be the advancement of the interests of this province and the welfare of its people.

Ordered, that the consideration of the draft address be made the order of the day for Monday next.

House adjourned till three o'clock on Monday.
