TELEGRAPHIC NEWS.

UNITED STATES.

NEW YORK, May 27.

An Albany special to the Times says at midnight the conference between Conkling, vice-President Arthur, Governor Cornell and Speaker Sharp ended, and it has been decided a caucus will be called for Monday evening. The Legislature will adjourn as usual on Friday until Monday. According to the estimates made by careful men on both sides, the stalwarts now have 46 men upon whom they can positively rely and the administration men with accessions reported to-night have 46 men who will not go into caucus.

ST. LOUIS, May 27.

The Duke of Sutherland and party passed through here on Thursday en route to California.

WASHINGTON, May 27.

Secretary Hunt to-day forwarded instructions to Commander Cooper, commanding the United States ship Alliance, now at Norfolk, Va., to proceed on a cruise in search of the Jeanette between Greenland, Iceland and the coast of Norway, and as far as the northern coast of Spitzbergen, if it is possible to get there without endangering the vessel. Before sailing the bow of the Alliance will be sheathed with live oak two inches thick. The Alliance will take on board an extra supply of provisions, to be prepared in the event of falling in with the Jeanette. Commander Cooper is directed to take a pilot at St. John's, Newfoundland who is familiar with the coast of Iceland, and other pilots as the cruise progresses.

ALBANY, May 26.

Mr. Conkling and his association have gone to New York. The situation generally is unchanged, both sides expressing themselves sanguine of victory, next week when the voting commences. Many believe there will be a lengthy deadlock.

SAN FRANCISCO, Cal. May 27.

A Bode dispatch says some irresponsible parties demand the discharge of the Chinese employed on the railroad approaching the town. On a refusal about 40 armed men went to the Chinese camp about 30 miles distant.

The railroad people sent a courier to the camp and had the whole outfit with their supplies transferred to an Island in Mono Lake. The rioters not being prepared for a long campaign returned to the town and endeavored to raise funds to provide provisions, but with slight success. The movement has not the sympathy of the people or of the Miners' Union, who disavow any connection with it.

GREAT BRITAIN AND IRELAND.

DUBLIN, May 27.

There are well grounded rumors that Foster, who has come to Ireland, has determined to suppress, for a time at least, all land meetings in Ireland.

Five meetings of first class importance are announced for Sunday, and the attitude of the authorities is watched with some anxiety.

Although protected by six hundred troops and police, a process server at Glasgow, County Leitrim, was foiled in an attempt to serve processes on some of Lord Annesley's tenants by the threatening attitude of the people.

All is quiet in the County of Limerick. The authorities have not yet intimated when they will renew the attempt to carry out evictions at New Pallas and Kilmallock. A rumor has reached Carrick-on-Shannon, County Leitrim, of a serious process serving at Geagh, ten miles distant, but details are indefinite.

Two men are said to have been mortally wounded. Eight houses were burned by incendiaries in the County Cork, on Wednesday night. It is stated the object was to get at one man whose house was unknown.

LONDON, May 27.

At the meeting of the General Assembly of the Scotch Free Church, yesterday, Dr. Adam, of Glasgow, moved a resolution, of which he had given notice, relative to Professor Smith. Professor Bruce moved that the Assembly decline to give effect to Dr. Adam's motion. After six hours' discussion 304 members voted for Dr. Adam's motion and 231 for that of Professor Bruce. Professor Bruce and others protested against the decision of the Assembly.

EUROPE AND THE EAST.

BERLIN, May 27.

A convention incorporating Hamburg in the Zollverein was signed on Thursday, on a basis favorable to Hamburg.

BERLIN, May 27.

It is denied that the convention incorporating Hamburg in the Zollverein is yet signed, though it is expected it will be in a few days.

Depretis continues to encounter difficulties in the formation of a cabinet, but it is believed he will ultimately succeed.

ATHENS, May 27.

The Government have decided to ratify a convention with Turkey without consulting the Chamber.

SOUTH AFRICA.

LONDON, May 27.

The Standard's correspondent at Newcastle, Natal, says he has interviewed John Dunn. The latter represented to the Royal Commission that if independence was restored to the Boers, the British were bound either to protect the Zulus or return them the arms which Sir Garnet Wolseley took away.
