Death of Garfield!

A Pain at the Heart.

Quiet Scene at the Close.

Heroism of Mrs. Garfield.

[We are indebted to T. C. James, Esq., for the following particulars.]

OFFICIAL BULLETIN. LONG BRANCH, Sept. 19, 11.50 p. m. The President died at 10.35. After the bulletin was issued at 5.30 this evening the President continued in much the same condition as during the afternoon, his pulse ranging from 102 to 106 with rather increased force and volume. After taking nourishment he fell into a quiet sleep for about thirty five minutes. Before his death, and while asleep, his pulse rose to 120 and was somewhat more feeble. At ten minutes past ten he awoke, and complained of severe pain over the region of the heart, and almost immediately became unconscious and ceased to breathe at 10.30.

Previous to his death the only words spoken by the President were that he had a severe pain in his heart.

It is supposed by the Surgeons that death was caused by a clot of blood forming in the heart.

Dr. Bliss was the first one notified of the President's expression of pain, and upon entering the room, at once saw that the end was near.

The members of the family were immediately summoned to the bed side. All arrived and perfect quiet prevailed.

Mrs. Garfield bore the trying ordeal with great fortitude, and exhibited unprecedented courage. She gave way to no paroxysms of grief, and after death became evident she quietly withdrew to her own room.

The death scene was one never to be forgotten. Perfect quiet prevailed, and not a murmur was heard while the President was sinking. After death had been pronounced, the body was properly arranged by Dr. Beaton.

Mr. Morris, the undertaker, of Long Branch, has charge of the remains.

WARREN, Me., Sept. 17.

In a fit of jealousy last night, Charles Smith went to the house of his wife's parents, David McRobbins and wife, and shot Mrs. McRobbins and his wife, aged 19, both fatally; and his year and-a-half old son killing the latter instantly. A Mrs. Metcalf who lived in the house and was present, fled, a bullet grazing her ear, and taking her two children hid in the woods. Smith went to the police, confessed the crime and surrendered.

CHICAGO, Sept. 17.

Unusually cold weather is reported from Des Moines and other parts of Iowa for several days. Snow fell along the Rock Island road between De Soto, twenty miles west of here, and some points in Nebraska. There is snow two inches in depth at Omaha. The weather is cloudy and very cold.

NEW YORK, Sept. 17.

In a race yesterday at Fulton, N. J., over a three-quarter mile course rowed over four times between Courtney and Riley, the latter was capsized by collision with an outside boat and Courtney rowed over the course, said to be three miles and 65 feet, in 13 minutes and 52 seconds. The time was remarkable, but high wind aided him materially.

GREAT BRITAIN AND IRELAND.

LONDON, Sept. 17.

The cotton movement has assumed a more important aspect than hitherto. A meeting at Manchester yesterday of manufacturers of North and East Lancashire unanimously favored running only three days weekly for a month, or during such time as the spinners have stopped, provided two-thirds of the looms are willing to adopt that course. The meeting adjourned until Thursday. If the suggestion is carried out agitation will be greatly extended and matters will become much more serious for the Liverpool cotton brokers.

LONDON, Sept. 17.

The "Times" Dublin report says: The drift of all the speeches at the Land League convention was that the Land League should not think of accepting the Land Act as a final settlement.

EUROPEAN.

LONDON, Sept. 17.

It is officially announced that the French Government has consented to prolong the treaty of commerce with Great Britain three months from the 8th of November, a joint commission meeting in Paris on Monday.

A Standard Paris despatch states that M. Suberoff, Russian ambassador at Berlin, is on his way to Paris and London to invite co-operation of France and England to a joint scheme to suppress revolutionism.

CAIRO, Sept. 17.

The Khedive to-day, after asking earnestly for news of President Garfield's health, said: "The height of my ambition and all I live for is happiness and prosperity of all the people of Egypt, regardless of religion or nationality. Since my accession I have taken as my model American civilization, which admits of no distinction either of race or of religion but my task is beset with great difficulties."
