Cardinal Will Join In Quebec Ceremonies

Cap de la Madeleine, Que., Aug. 8 (CP) — James Cardinal McGuigan of Toronto will officiate at a pontifical high mass here Aug. 15 to mark the Roman Catholic feast of the Assumption of Mary. The Cardinal will address both in French and English the thousands of persons expected to crowd the Cap de la Madeleine shrine for the celebrations.

Archbishop Alexandre Vachon of Ottawa will celebrate a midnight mass Aug. 14 and Bishop George Leon Felleter of Three Rivers will sing a morning mass before the pontifical high mass.

Cap de la Madeleine is a nationally-known shrine some 90 miles down the St. Lawrence River from Montreal.

Sea View "Whitehead" Club

Club held its judging class at the home of Mr. Roscoe Walker, Kensington, on August 1st. They were transported to Mr. Walker's home by Mr. Eddie Murphy, Sea View, in his large truck, and a very instructive and interesting judging class was conducted by Morris Deacon, Department of Agriculture. Eighteen members were present and made a good job of placing the class of three fine Herefords.

On Thursday afternoon, August 3rd, the members of the Mt. Hope Farmington Grain Club had their grain plots scored by Mr. Bruce MacLaren, Cerealist, Dominion Experimental Farm, Charlottetown. Eleven members had plots this year and some very good stands of grain were seen.

At a meeting in the evening Mr. MacLaren outlined to the members what he had seen during his inspection tour and described his method of scoring. He scored the plots on variety purity, freedom from weeds, freedom from other grain, freedom from disease and on uniformity and vigour. He then went on to point out how they could improve their work, and encouraged them to keep on with the good work. He suggested that next year the group all sow registered or certified seed of the same variety and also that they pay particular attention to the land they choose.

The next meeting of the club will be held in Farmington School sometime during the week following Old Home Week. At this meeting some system of arranging for prizes and other details of the club's program will be arranged. At their first meeting in September, Mr. MacLaren offered to be present and conduct a judging class of threshed grain samples. This should provide an interesting and educational evening for the members.

Members of the Bedeque, Freetown, and Norboro Calf Clubs held an enjoyable picnic at Louis Pearson's shore, Chelton, on Thursday afternoon, August 3rd. The parents of a large number of the club members were also present. Swimming, volley ball, softball, and running races were enjoyed during the afternoon. However, the activity which seemed most popular to everyone was when the ladies served hot-dogs and ice-cream and everyone forgot about playing ball for a while. There was one young fellow who ate eight hot-dogs and had seven large cones of ice-cream and there was still plenty left when everyone was finished eating. Morris Deacon and David Peacock, Fieldmen, Dept. of Agriculture, looked after the afternoon program and the three clubs each chipped in to supply the hot-dogs and ice-cream.

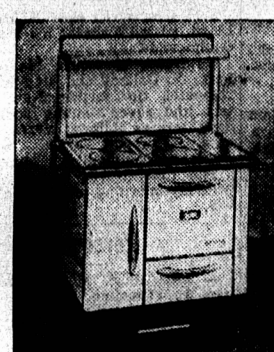
