The president's report showed that the association has just completed one of the most successful years in its history. The year just completed was the twenty-fifth anniversary of the Charlottetown Association and during the annual campaign week, this was marked by a party at the Y.M.C.A. given to the workers and the original founders of the organization by the executive of the association.

The year's activities were reviewed and the coming season's program outlined. This program includes The Song Masters, a group of male singers; The Beaux Arts Trio, an instrumental group of violin, cello and piano; Mary MacMurray, mezzo soprano and Ray Dudley, a young, highly-gifted Canadian pianist.

Mrs. Rogers expressed the sorrow of the executive and directors in the passing of Mrs. J. L. Curran, who was the recording secretary of the association, and a valued worker ever since the beginning of Community Concerts in Charlottetown.

To Start Big Resources Development Next Year

FREDERICTON (CP) — Some time next year underground machinery is expected to start grinding in northern New Brunswick to climax an unprecedented staking rush that started three years ago in rugged bush-country.

"Everything is going ahead as expected," says provincial mine director C. S. Clements, and by next year the vast deposits of lead-zinc-copper-silver concentrates should begin moving to market. Then New Brunswick will begin cashing in on the biggest resources development in its history.

Mr. Clements says American Metals and Brunswick Mining and Smelting Corporation are both shooting for 1957 production—the beginning of an 8,000-ton daily output. "You know, these tonnages so far discovered are absolutely fabulous."

BIG ESTIMATED TONNAGE
Soon after ore was struck in the Bathurst area, a total of 41,616 claims were staked, and at the end of 1955 the government listed 41,824 in good standing. Estimated tonnages down to the 1,000-foot level range between 60,000,000 and 70,000,000 tons, and drills that have hit the 1,400-foot level have found continuous ore. Nobody knows how much is actually there.

When first discovered the deposits attracted such adjectives as "tremendous" and "fabulous" from mining men, and Mr. Clements says interest has not diminished. There has been steady and encouraging progress, he says. Keymet Mines, which closed its mine early this year, plans to set up again over an ore body only a few miles from the earlier site. No date has been set for its production.

When Mines Minister N. B. Buchanan commented on the province's mineral future early in 1954 he said it would be "some years" before production would begin in earnest.

NEED HYDRO POWER
One of the problems still to be overcome is the development of hydro power to sustain all operations and eventually operate a big smelting plant. This proposed smelting plant, one of Premier Fleming's favorite subjects, will cost an estimated \$30,000,000. Until this is built, ore will be shipped mainly to European smelters.

Some officials are hopeful that sulphur mines may be developed in the ore-streaked territory when base metals of lesser value would be a by-product. Some of the ores contain up to 40 per cent sulphur. Meanwhile, Brunswick Corporation says its expenditure in mine development in the area will be about \$27,000,000.

The largest known ore deposit, with reserves estimated at 28,000,000 tons, averages 5.28 per cent zinc, 1.88 per cent lead, 0.58 per cent copper and 1.79 ounces of silver per ton.

N. B. Girl Killed In Montreal
MONTREAL (CP) — Twelve-year-old Lesmie Boudreau of Green Point, N.B., died in hospital Friday of injuries suffered Thursday when struck by a taxi cab in the city's west end.

Police said the girl had been staying here with her aunt, Mrs. D. Boudreau, and was hit while attempting to cross the street alone near her aunt's home on Western avenue.

The girl first was taken to Queen Elizabeth Hospital for treatment of facial injuries. She later was transferred to the Montreal Neurological Institute.

Police identified the taxi driver as getting going in this period of the School year.
