The Chinese Legation in Paris.

PARIS, July 8.—The Chinese legation in Paris presents the appearance of a house where death has occurred. The Venetian blinds are kept closed, and strict orders have been given to the concierge to admit no one. The secretary of the legation declares that a Chinese Government no longer exists, and that the country is in a state of revolution. He says that two-thirds of the Chinese quarter of Peking has been burned and looted by the Boxers, who have no more respect for the Chinese than they have for foreigners. He adds that if the members of the Government were not prisoners they would have sent instructions to the Chinese representatives abroad.

Local and Other Items

FORESTERS.—Regular meeting of Court A vandale tonight at 8 o'clock. Election of High Court representatives, etc.

WARSHIPS COMING.—Mr. David Small, Harbor Master, this afternoon received a despatch from the Admiral stating that the warships, Crescent, Tribune and Quail would arrive in Charlottetown Thursday forenoon.

THE SEASON'S FESTIVITIES.—The Picnic at Rocky Point and China Point yesterday proved to be most enjoyable, and all had a good time notwithstanding the shower or two of rain during the afternoon. To-day there is a large attendance at the tea at Kinkora.

EXCURSION.—The choir of the First Methodist Church intend holding a moonlight excursion on Monday evening, the 16th inst., on the Jacques Cartier. Don't make any other engagement for that night. As a good time is guaranteed—if we may judge by the success of last year's excursion. —2in.

CITY SCHOOL BOARD.—The regular monthly meeting of the City School Board was held last evening. The teachers' reports showed that the enrollment for the month of June was 1,364, the average attendance, 1,054 and the percentage of attendance 87. The tender of Clarkin Bros. for coal was accepted. D. Bethune's tender for white-washing was accepted.

ZION CHURCH.—The half-yearly business meeting of the Y. P. S. C. E. of Zion Church was held last night, when officers were elected as follows: Pres.—Laura McLeod. Vice-Pres.—Peter Innis. Recording Secretary—Agnes Sinclair, re-elected. Treasurer—Annie Ferguson, re-elected. The usual committees were also appointed.

DISTURBANCE ON TRAIN.—At the instigation of the railway authorities information was laid against two young men from Nod River, named John Clow and Chasley Clow charging them with fighting and otherwise creating a disturbance on the train from Summerside on Dominion Day. They appeared before a County Magistrate yesterday afternoon and on tendering an apology for their conduct and promising to behave better hereafter they were let off with a nominal fine. Two other young men implicated in the same disturbance will, in all probability, appear before the same magistrate in a few days.

CITY COUNCIL.—The regular monthly meeting was held last night. A communication from the Women's Council regarding the placing of the name of each street on the corner buildings and calling attention to the scattering of paper about the streets and squares, was referred to the street committee. A letter from Mr. W. P. Donih, recommending the removal of the fire alarm box from Johnson's corner to the Malpeque Road, near the old cemetery, and recommending boxes with glass fronts, was referred to the fire committee. The City Clerk was authorized to write the Superintendent of the railway in connection with the nuisance complained of by Mr. John Bolger. Councillor Tanton reported that a new electric light had been placed at the corner of Upper Pownall and Chestnut Streets. Councillor Wheat, for the information of Councilor Horne, said the Finance Committee were arranging for band music in Queen Square Gardens. The tender of Bradley and Ramsay was accepted for the new bridge at Brighton, the amount being \$997. Action regarding the tenders for street lighting was deferred.
