

ISLE OF MAN.

Between Great Britain and the Isle of Man, by Packet Boats, over and above all other Rates, *Two Pence.*

The BRITISH DOMINIONS in AMERICA, including his Majesty's Islands in the WEST INDIES.

For Letters conveyed by Packet Boats between London and any Part of the British Dominions in America, or his Majesty's West India Islands, *Twelve Pence.*

For Letters conveyed by Packet Boats from any Port in the British Dominions in America, or the West Indies, to any other Port within the same Dominions, *Four Pence.*

For the inland Conveyance of Letters, in the said Dominions, from any Post Office to any Place not exceeding sixty English Miles, and not passing through a chief Office, *Four Pence.*

For any Distance above 60, and not exceeding 100 English Miles, and not passing through a chief Office, *Six Pence.*

For any Distance above 100, and not exceeding 200 English Miles, and not passing through a chief Office, *Eight Pence.*

For any Distance above 200, and not exceeding 300 English Miles, and not passing through a chief Office, *Ten Pence.*

For any Distance above 300, and not exceeding 400 English Miles, and not passing through a chief Office, *Twelve Pence.*

And so in Proportion, the Postage increasing *Two Pence* on every single Letter for every 100 Miles.

SHIP LETTERS.

For the Port of every Letter or Packet of Letters, in any Part of his Majesty's Dominions, directed to or coming from on Board of any Ship, over and above the Rates before mentioned, *One Penny.*

For every Letter or Packet coming from on Ship-board, for the Town where landed, on the Delivery thereof, *One Penny*, with the Penny paid to the Master, Mariner, or Passenger, bringing the same, being for every such Letter or Packet, *Two Pence.*

FOREIGN LETTERS.

There must be paid at Halifax, with all Letters, for any of the following Places, the different Rates of Postage as under mentioned for single Letters and so in Proportion, and if put in at any Post Office in the Country, there must be added the Postage between that Office and Halifax, without which they cannot be forwarded. Therefore all Persons are to take particular Notice thereof, to prevent the Necessity of their Letters being opened and returned for the Postage.

To any Part of Holland, France, or Flanders (or to the Town of Geneva in Switzerland through France) *One Shilling.*

To any Part of Spain or Portugal, through France or by Lisbon, *Two Shillings and Six Pence.*

To any Part of Italy, Sicily, Turkey, Switzerland, Alsace, and Minorca, through France, (except to Geneva) *Two Shillings and Three Pence.*

To any Part of Italy, Sicily, Turkey, Germany, Switzerland, Denmark, Sweden, Russia and all Parts of the North, through Holland and Flanders, *Two Shillings.*

To Gibraltar, *Two Shillings and Six Pence.*

To Port Mahon, *Two Shillings and Three Pence.*

To any Part of the United States of America, Packet Postage to New York, *Four Pence.*

To the East Indies, *One Shilling.*

NOTE.—All double, treble, and other Letters and Packets whatever, (except by the Penny Post, pay in Proportion to the respective Rates of single Letters before specified.—Packets chargeable by Weight pay after the Rate of four single Letters for every Ounce Weight.

The Postage of Letters from any of the British Colonies in North America, to any Part of his Majesty's Dominions in Europe (except to Gibraltar and Port Mahon) may or may not be paid at the Time of putting them in o any Post Office, at the Option of the Writer, except the American inland Postage to Halifax, which must be paid where the Letters are put in, otherwise they must be opened and returned to the Writer for that Postage.

All Merchants Accounts not exceeding one Sheet of Paper, and all Bills of Exchange, Invoices, and Bills of Lading, to or from any Parts or Places, not within his Majesty's Dominions; and the Covers of Letters to or from Turkey, and not exceeding one Quarter of a Sheet of Paper, are allowed to pass without Payment of the Foreign Postage, but are to pay the full Inland Post to and from London.

LETTERS to all Parts of Europe, are dispatched from London every Tuesday and Friday, except those to Portugal, which are forwarded by the Lisbon Mails on Tuesdays only.

Letters to all Parts of America, are dispatched from London the first Wednesday in every Month.

Letters for the East Indies dispatched from London, as the Occasion offers.

The Post sets off regularly, every Saturday at 4 o'Clock in the Afternoon, with the Mails for all Parts of the Country, from Halifax to Canada.—Letters to go in those Mails must be put into the Post Office by Three o'Clock.

NOTE.—That the above Rates being for a single Letter, it is to be observed, that a double Letter must pay double the Sum mentioned in this Table; a treble Letter, three Times the Sum, an Ounce Weight, four Times the Sum, and so in Proportion, accounting every Ounce Weight equal to four single Letters.

FOREIGN INTELLIGENCE.

NATIONAL ASSEMBLY OF FRANCE.

MAY 20.

M. Gensoumi denounced the Austrian Committee. He was supported in this accusation by M. Brisot; but the Assembly adjourned the discussion until Wednesday.

The Minister of Justice rose, and said, that the King having heard of a number of calumnies relative to the existence of a pretended Austrian Committee, that assembled at the Thuilleries, had sent for him this morning; and after stating, that he was afraid these accusations should trouble the harmony of the state, and be attended with the most fatal consequences in the army, he had given him orders to denounce the Journalists who had propagated these reports, to the Accusateur Public of the Criminal Tribunal, so that the Nation might be assured of the loyalty of his actions, and his fidelity to the oath he had taken to maintain the Constitution.
