B. I. S. PICNIC.—The members of the Souris Benevolent Irish Society are having a fine day for their picnic. A large number of persons, including a goodly delegation from the Benevolent Irish Society here, and the Artillery Band, left the city early this morning.

NOVA SCOTIA'S APPLE CROP.—It becomes more and more evident that the apple crop is a failure in some parts of Nova Scotia. Several farmers in the vicinity of Canning who are in the habit of selling from 120 to 200 barrels, will not have more than 10 to 15 this year, and some will have none at all.

ANOTHER STEAMER.—We understand that Messrs. Pickford & Black have chartered a second steamer, the Bergenseren, to run between Halifax and Havana, in connection with the Beta. The Bergenseren will sail from Halifax on Oct. 1st, Oct. 22nd and Nov. 14th. This will be a great convenience for intending shippers of potatoes, on which the through rate from Charlottetown will be 95 cents per barrel. Any further information will be cheerfully furnished by the agent here, Mr. W. W. Clarke.

BODY FOUND.—The body of Captain Joseph Green, of the ill-fated schooner Richard Thompson, was picked up, about two miles from where the bodies of the two sailors were found, early this morning. The face was disfigured beyond recognition, but the hands were not injured. A bill of lading with the captain's name therein was amongst the articles found in the deceased's pockets. The body will be taken to Summerside for interment.

A DARING ROBBERY.—The store of John L. Pye & Son, at Tidnish, N. S., was burglarized on Sunday night, and \$1,025 in cash taken. The money was in envelopes lying on the bottom of the safe. Thirty-five dollars in the cash box was untouched. An entrance was effected through a barn which is attached to the shop. Mr. Pye and his family sleep over the shop. The safe was opened with a duplicate key, which was left on the floor, and the envelopes were found 30 yards from the store.

POLICE COURT.—Two drunks were fined \$2 or 8 days each this morning; one woman was fined \$1 and costs for assaulting another woman; and another of the "gentler sex" was fined \$1 and costs for using abusive language towards a young man. A well known "lady of distinction" was given one month in jail for vagrancy, and a young man was remanded 8 days to answer a charge of larceny. The young woman suspected of stealing the money from Mrs. Cody (the particulars of which we published yesterday), and who was brought to town from Summerside by Police Sergeant Bradley last evening, was discharged from custody as there was no evidence whatever that she was the guilty person, and the prosecutor stated that the only reason she had for suspecting the girl of the theft was the sudden nature of her departure for Boston.

TELEGRAPHIC NEWS.

Striking Switchmen.

CHICAGO, Aug. 26. The switchmen on the Chicago and Alton Railroad struck this morning. A detachment of police has been sent to the yards of the company. The Stock Yards Switching Association, whose switchmen went out on a strike, has decided to dissolve the Association and allow that road to do its own switching. The striking switchmen were told their services were no longer required, and new men were procured to do the switching. A despatch was received at the office of the Lake Shore Railroad to-day from General Passenger Agent Daniels, of the New York Central, stating that the latter company had resumed the carrying of perishable freight and that all traffic is being moved as usual. Passenger trains are on time, and no further trouble is anticipated.

Halifax News.

HALIFAX, Aug. 26. Sir John Ross gave a grand ball this evening to the leaders of society. Officers of the army and navy and militia were present, the number of guests invited being over 500. The illumination of the grounds surrounding the General's residence was very beautiful, and was enjoyed by the guests promading between the dances. The ball is one of a series of similar festivities centering around Prince George. Forty Nova Scotia riflemen will compete in the Ottawa shooting, opening September 1.

Ottawa Notes.

OTTAWA, Aug. 26. The steamer Newfoundland, which has been in service laying the second cable to Anticosti, will, after coaling at Pictou, proceed to the repairs of the Magdalene Island cable, which will be related to St. Paul's Island, a distance of 18 miles. She will then proceed to Grand Manan to repair the existing cable and lay a new cable to Whitehead Island. Sir John Macdonald will return to Ottawa by the end of next week, when regular Council meetings will be resumed.

Athletics in St. John.

ST. JOHN, Aug. 26. A meeting of the friends and supporters of the St. John Amateur Athletic Club was held to-night. It was decided that the St. Johns should retire from the New Brunswick League, but the team should not disband. It is now intended to bring outside clubs here. In the League base-ball game this afternoon, the Shamrocks beat the Monctons, 11 to 4.

Adam Brown's Mission.

MONTREAL, Aug. 26. Adam Brown, M. P., Canadian Commissioner to the Jamaica Exhibition, left this evening for the Canadian Pacific for St. John, N. B., in connection with his mission. Mr. Brown will visit other points in the Maritime Provinces, returning to address the Montreal Board of Trade on the 15th September.

Leprosy in Cape Breton.

A correspondent of the Halifax Herald writes: "Through the medium of your paper, I desire to call the attention of the authorities to several cases of leprosy near Englishtown, N. S. The disease has proved fatal to one person already, and as those now afflicted are constantly associating with the surrounding people, it is probable the number of cases will increase. If this terrible disease really exists, as stated by the correspondent, steps should be taken at once to have the persons afflicted sent away where they would not likely communicate the disease to others. The attention of the authorities should be directed to this district at once."
