A QUESTION ANSWERED.

The Guardian enquires: "Will some of our 'renowned' contemporaries point out any grievance of the Manitoba minority that is in any way different from those which the Roman Catholic minority in the Maritime Provinces are enduring, or enjoying with the utmost complacency?"

One of the regulations of the Board of Education in Manitoba is as follows: "To establish the habit of right doing, instruction in moral principles must be accompanied by training in moral practices. The teachers' influence and example, current incidents, stories, memory gems, sentiments in the school lesson, examination of motives that prompt action, didactic talks, teaching the Ten Commandments, etc., are means to be employed."

Is there any such regulation governing the schools of the Maritime Provinces? Fancy a god Roman Catholic teacher instructing a number of Presbyterian children under the authority of this regulation, filling them up with his "memory gems," "didactic talks" and daily dissertations on the way to keep the Ten Commandments, etc., and the feelings of the Presbyterian parents upon finding out that their children had been strongly impressed by his Roman Catholic principles? Would there then be no grievance?

LET HIM SPEAK. Several correspondents have called THE EXAMINER'S attention to the fact that the agent of the Merchant's Bank of P. P. Island at Souris is taking an active part in the campaign. We think this a matter which affects the Bank rather than the public. If the shareholders of the Bank are content that their officials and servants shall go about the country advising the electors to vote down the National Policy and the Remedial Policy of the Government and vote up the patent combination of Laurier, McCarthy and Mallory, recently formed by Mr. Farver, we have no right to complain. It is their business. Whether it will profit their business with the whole country to have their agents taking one side in a political contest is a question for their consideration. This is a free country, and men are free to go about the country and speak at public meetings—if they are in a position to do so.

If, as a mere political leader, he shows himself so incompetent, how shall he be able to perform the higher duties of a statesman? Will Mr. Laurier's friends answer that? No, they cannot.

THE FIRST EFFECT.

The Montreal Star remarks that some of the first effects of the condition of uncertainty as to the tariff, caused by the possibility of a triumph for the anti-Protectionist allies, are to be seen in London, where the McClary Manufacturing Company is cutting its pay-roll temporarily in two for this reason. Last pay day the employees of this Company received the following printed notice: "Our pay sheet is \$4,000 per week; our collections are much below current expenses. From depression and threatened tariff disturbance, prudence prompts us to reduce our pay sheet one-half as nearly as possible. It is with regret that we are asked to reduce our staff or ask employees to work shorter time. It has always been our study to give them employment the year round. It is our wish that they feel they have an interest in the business. We hope for the best for the city and country. Until the trade policy of the country is assured we may look for a waiting condition. We recommend the strictest economy to be maintained, as far as possible, against our unfavorable conditions."

The Star remarks further that "if the uncertainty as to the Canadian tariff becomes acute, as it would, for instance, were the Liberals to win the elections, there is no likelihood that the McClary case would long remain unique. Other manufacturing firms would be compelled to take in sail until they knew for a certainty the direction of the wind. Hands might be laid off here, and departments shut down there, and half-time adopted somewhere else until it was known what the new Government intended to do with the tariff. The effect of such cautionary proceedings is always cumulative; and men out of work or on half pay soon throw trade generally out of joint. Distrust might easily lead to dismay, and dismay to panic before the Liberal Finance Minister had made known his will; and the hard times that the National Policy met at the border and saved us from two years ago might rise in our midst from internal causes and bring disaster to our people." The effect of this upon the farmers whose home market was suddenly deprived of much of its purchasing power, the Star, says, may well be imagined. "When the dinner pail is empty, the men who have been accustomed to make a living by filling it, suffer as surely as does the man who once enjoyed emptying it." In point of fact, if we are not warned by the experience of the States, we shall have the same experience as the States. Voters, beware!

POTATOES. A GENTLEMAN in Charlottetown addressed a letter to a friend in Woodstock, New Brunswick, for information as to the prices of potatoes in Aroostook County, Maine, and in Carleton County, New Brunswick. We quote the reply: "Replying to yours of the 3rd inst., there are, of course, no printed statistics re prices on potatoes in Carleton and Aroostook Counties. The actual prices, however, were as follows: SEASON OF 1895. Potatoes in Aroostook, 20 to 30c. per bbl. " Carleton, 50 to 70c."

"At the present time the farmers of Aroostook County, or rather a great number of them, have quite a lot of potatoes in their cellars which they are unable to dispose of at even 10c per bbl., while our farmers dispose of the few they still have on hand at 5c per cwt. So great has been the decrease in this, the principal product of Aroostook, that many who a few years ago were prosperous and considered exceptionally well off, are today little better than bankrupt. These statements are actual, and can very easily be substantiated. "I am glad to see that you are interesting yourself in politics. Things are progressing very favorably in Carleton, and I am confident that the great stronghold will go back on its record this time and elevate Hale to the pinnacle of victory."

HUMBUGGING THE PEOPLE. A Winnipeg despatch of the 9th inst. states that Premier Greenway, addressing a political meeting in Ligar, said: "It has been reported that the Manitoba Government would settle the School Question if Mr. Laurier came into power. The local government, so long as he had any connection with it, would never make any settlement of the School Question which would involve the restoration of separate schools." No one who gives Mr. Greenway the slightest credit for political honesty can doubt that this is true. Mr. Greenway, as the Premier representative of the majority in Manitoba, must of necessity oppose the restoration of the separate schools to which the minority are entitled under the constitution. Mr. Laurier and Mr. Davies and all others who say that the appointment of a commission of enquiry will result in a mutual and satisfactory settlement are merely humbugging the people and working for a prolongation of the agony. Mr. Greenway cannot recede from the wrong position he has taken without turning traitor to the majority which placed him in power. This fact may as well be recognized, and the passage of the Remedial Bill authorized at once. The Manitoba Question has already been open for the past six years. Let it now be closed in the manner provided by the Constitution and pointed out by the Lords of the Privy Council.

CAMPAIGN NOTES.

—Is Mr. Laurier trying to deceive Ontario or Quebec? —The Winnipeg Nor'wester offers to bet \$1,000 that Hugh John Macdonald defeats Joe Martin. —Mail and Empire: Canadians are sufficiently British to discard the statesman who talks both ways. —The men who made the Laurier-McCarthy-Mallory combination are the men who will, if the Government is defeated, rule Canada during the next five years. —Sir Charles Tupper's wonderful capacity for work is exemplified by the fact that, commencing with Tuesday, he is scheduled for thirty public addresses in Ontario during the next eight days. —Rev. T. S. Rowe has declined the McClary nomination for West Toronto. Mr. Brock in North Middlesex and Mr. Taylor in East Middlesex, both McCarthy nominees, have retired. They say they have no hope of election. —Mr. Laurier told his audience in London, Ontario, that he would have been proud to serve under such a leader as Mr. Blake. Mr. Blake's last deliverance on Canadian affairs does not go to show that he has the same confidence in Mr. Laurier. —The St. John Telegraph's graphic report of Sir Charles Tupper's speech at Ottawa on Monday night states that Sir Charles "discussed the issues of the campaign. The Liberal financial trade policy was torn to pieces. It was a pity that would have left us hewers of wood and drawers of water had it succeeded." This is a great admission from the Telegraph.

—The McClary Manufacturing Company, employing the largest number of men of any firm in London, Ont., has notified its hands that owing to the unsettled state of political affairs, and the destruction to business men that would result from lowering the protective tariff, they will either have to reduce their staff or put them on short time. Mr. McClary declares this order is not for political effect. —Hitherto the Montreal Star, independent, which tries to get impartial forecasts, has predicted a Liberal sweep in the province of Manitoba. Its latest estimate shows important changes, giving to the government Winnipeg, Selkirk, Macdonald and Provencher, the Liberals Marquette, the McCarthyites Brandon, with Ligar doubtful.

—The Week: In dealing with a question in which the principles of justice, religious toleration, and national peace are so greatly jeopardized, every Canadian citizen who looks to the welfare and peaceful development of his country would do well to consider this issue stripped of party, racial and religious prejudice, the garb in which unscrupulous professional politicians are to-day presenting it to the electorate. —The regular party men express no doubt as to the result of the election, and declare that the government will be handsomely sustained in Ontario. A Star correspondent asked a well-posted independent man, who said: "Both parties are claiming victory in Ontario, but, unlike previous contests, there are insufficient grounds for forming any definite opinion. I would not be surprised to see Ontario equally divided between opponents and supporters of the Government."

—The Patriot of Tuesday contains a report in which it is stated that Mr. L. H. Davies said at Picton that the Premier had promised Prince Edward Island "seven branch railroads, aggregating 125 miles of track, and a half million dollars." Now, Sir Charles spoke of one hundred and five—not one hundred and twenty-five—miles of railway and he certainly did not say that the work would be four and a half million! Why does the Patriot give publicly such erroneous reports. —The following letter to the Halifax Herald needs no explanation: "Sir,—A report has gone broadcast throughout the province that we have changed our political views, which report we wish you to deny. We beg to say that we are, as ever, supporters of the Liberal-Conservative Dominion Government. E. C. CURRIE & SONS, Hantsport, June 9."

WHERE "FACTS" CAME FROM. "Sir,—Mr. Rob Angus has not complied with my request to state definitely whether he was implicated in the publication of the pamphlet misnamed 'The Facts,' and therefore the public can draw their own conclusions as to the truth of the charge against him. He complains, however, that I do not write over my own name, and asks me to do so. This complaint and request must strike everyone as very comical, coming as it does from an author of a pamphlet which cannot raise an acknowledged father, not even an anonymous one. Mr. Angus seems to consider that he has threatened to publish facts concerning him. So I have, but not of the personal kind he evidently fears. The facts printed at the office of Mr. John Coombs, Queen's Printer, from copy furnished by Mr. Rob Angus, and that the printer's proofs were read and corrected by him, and that when the copies were struck off they were sent as ordered by Mr. Angus. Mr. Angus has written two letters to THE EXAMINER, in neither of which he explicitly denied being implicated in the publication of the pamphlet. I admit that he does so inferentially and that he would like the public to believe that he had no hand in it. The merchants of this city who patronized the sheet by way of advertisement surely could not have been deceived of the nature of the production, for it is difficult to imagine how any mercantile person with any regard for the intelligences of the public could put an advertisement in such a sheet. A notice offering a reward for the discovery of a silver mine in Colorado might with propriety have been inserted as a satellite for the 'Facts.' If Mr. Angus thinks by placing himself to the front that in the event of the party obtaining power at Ottawa he will be rewarded by a public office, I may tell him that he is greatly mistaken in his expectations, for he never will get one. There are now too many ahead of him in the Liberal ranks, whose claims for preference are far ahead of those of Mr. Angus. I now conclude this correspondence. It has developed where 'Facts' came from, and that was the object in view when it was commenced. RESIDENT."
