Shocked Yanks Ask Why Reds First With "Moon"

NEW YORK (AP)—Millions of shocked Americans and friends are asking how come Russia launched an earth satellite before the United States.
Hurt in pride, angry, or worried, various American authorities and public figures suggest these reasons for Russia's success:
The U.S. didn't hit hard enough at rocket development immediately after the war, while Russia did.
The Western world failed to appreciate the excellence of much Soviet science.
Some think spies helped Russia immensely. And that they grabbed the cream of German rocket scientists after the war. But authorities say both ideas are wishful thinking.
Other and perhaps more fundamental explanations are advanced for Russia's scientific

surge:
She puts more stress on science, trains more scientists. She spends more on basic research.
SPEND MUCH TIME
In Soviet education, children in the fourth grade take mathematics and sciences nearly one-third of their time. In top grades of 10-year "complete secondary schools" these subjects take up half the day.
More youngsters are encouraged to take higher science courses, and courses are stiff, edu-

ucational experts report. Higher education schools now graduate nearly 200,000 men and women in science a year, about one-third in engineering.
Scientists are respected in the U.S.S.R., while surveys here show many students regard scientists or science students as "eggheads," if not downright peculiar.
The Russians spend great sums to gather and translate scientific literature published throughout the world.

MCA Employees In Labor Vote

OTTAWA (CP) — The Canada Labor Relations Board Wednesday ordered a representation vote among about 170 ground crew employees of Maritime Central Airways.

The vote was ordered following an application by the International Association of Machinists (I.A.M.) for certification as bargaining agent. The employees, engaged in maintenance and servicing of aircraft, are at Montreal, Charlottetown, Moncton, N.B., Frobisher, N.W.T., and Goose Bay and Gander in Newfoundland.

OTTAWA (CP) — William C. Bursley of St. John's has been appointed federal Progressive Conservative organizer for Newfoundland, a party headquarters announced Wednesday. Mr. Bursley, 26, is a newspaper and radio man.

Ghana Finance Minister Is Barred In U. S. Restaurant

NEW YORK (AP)—The finance minister of Ghana, who had Vice-President Nixon in for lunch at his home in Africa last March, says he was not allowed to eat in a restaurant in Dover, Del., because of his color.
K. A. Gbedemah, who speaks flawless English, reported the incident Tuesday on his return to New York. It was confirmed in Dover by Howard Cook, who operates the restaurant under a Howard Johnson franchise.
"If the vice-president of the United States can have a meal at my house when in Ghana, and if Adlai Stevenson can come into my home, then I cannot understand why I must receive this treatment at a roadside restaurant in America," Gbedemah said.
Gbedemah attended a cocktail party last month in Nixon's Washington home.
The Ghana official was prominent in the movement that led to independence for the former British African Gold Coast colony. He has been in the United States since Sept. 20 for meetings of the World Bank in Washington.

He said he and his private secretary, Bill Sutherland, an American and a Negro, "went in and ordered two glasses of orange juice at the counter."
WRAPPED IT UP
"The waitress," Gbedemah said, "brought it—wrapped up. I said, 'We want to drink it here.' 'She told me colored people were not allowed to eat in the restaurant. I intend to demand an apology from the Howard Johnson chain."
The chain usually does not operate a restaurant but allows its name to be used in return for the sale of its ice cream and other foods.
Gbedemah lunched Tuesday with Thomas E. Dewey, former New York governor. He plans to leave for London late today.

Unemployment Claims Increase

OTTAWA, (CP)—Initial and renewal claims for unemployment insurance benefits totalled 115,287 in August, up slightly from July's 114,107, the bureau of statistics said today.
However, this year's total was about 50 per cent greater than the 74,922 claims filed in the corresponding month in 1956.
Claimants at Aug. 30 constituted 5.4 per cent of insured persons as against 3.5 per cent last year.
Benefit payments amounted to \$13,033,311 in August, compared with \$13,799,832 in July and \$8,170,564 in August, 1956.

SHENANDOAH, Pa. (AP) — A 10-year-old boy fell 150 feet down a narrow drilling shaft Saturday and was pulled out alive with a rope an hour later. Richard Nasuti Jr., son of a retired coal miner, suffered shock and severe bruises and brush burns over much of his body.
