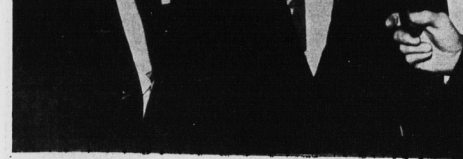


Fox Fur Industry Requires Incentive, Says Speaker

 "We'll have to have a financial incentive for the fur industry very soon unless some incentive is provided to retain the fur industry here," says W.R. Church, Ginnville, N.B., and the general manager of the P.E.I. Fur Breeders Association here this week.
 At a 4:30 p.m. 1963 meeting of the P.E.I. Fur Breeders Association here this week, Mr. Church was one of several New Brunswick breeders who furnished approximately one-half of 129 furs entered in the show held in the fox pavilion at the provincial exhibition grounds here Wednesday. He suggested the federal and provincial governments and the fur auction companies might consider the incentive and said the show should be continued.
 He spoke on behalf of N.B. breeders. The dinner in the Queen Hotel was presided over by W.R. Thompson, association president.
 Lowell Hascott, Summerside, suggested that any old fox records, photographs and copies of the type of prospects listed to promote companies in days that are past, should be handed to the headquarters of the Canadian National Silver Fox Breeders Association in Summerside. They will be turned over to the Fathers of Confederation Memorial museum here when it is completed, he told the group.
 The Summerside man also reported on the annual meeting in Regina last September of the Canadian Silver Fox Breeders which he attended as a delegate from the association.
 Mr. Church, general manager of the fur marketing department, Hadson's Bay Company, Montreal, spoke optimistically about the market for the coming season, and complimented showmen on the quality of their exhibits.
 Parven Cass, Summerside who judged the fox show, said though there are some outstanding specimens in the silver sector, the animals are not furred as well as former years.
 Mink Judges Gil Fournier, HBC Montreal and Charles Wright, Truro, N.S., also spoke briefly.
 Association president Irving Thompson, Dunstafate provided.

St. Mary's Requests Signing Of Contracts

SUMMERSIDE BUREAU OF THE GUARDIAN
Trustees of St. Mary's Academy on Wednesday night presented a brief to the governing Board of School Trustees which contained the following recommendations:
 "St. Mary's Academy is, and ever has been, open to the children of the town of Summerside, regardless of their religious affiliation. The members of its staff hold licenses from the department of education which authorizes them to teach in the schools of the province, and to receive salaries for their services from the department, and in the operation of their school, they satisfy all the requirements of the school act."
 "It continued, 'This year, the academy is providing accommodation and tuition for more than 200 children of the town. Nevertheless, it is receiving no remuneration whatsoever for either the province or the town for the services of its teachers or for classrooms, fuel, light and power, janitor service, etc.'"
"MISCARriage OF JUSTICE"
 "Since the members of your board are possessed of a proper sense of fair play, we ask you whether there has not been a miscarriage of justice a right in the non-payment of St. Mary's Academy for the valuable services that it is rendering to the community."
 "The brief comments that the department of education will pay the salaries of the teachers of the academy provided it is their contracts are signed by the board and a request is made that the board sign the contracts of these teachers so that they may receive the salaries provided by the provincial government and added it being understood that your doing so will in no way commit your board to make any payment in addition to that made by the department of education."
 Yesterday, W. Chester S. MacDonald, chairman of the Town School Board of Trustees, said that a decision in regards to the brief will be deferred by the board until the next meeting, Dec. 11.

ALBERTON — Rev. K. J. H. Whitney, B.A.B.D., of the United Church, Sunday evening at Alberton, U.C.W. thanking services will be held.
 Mr. Whitney, a native of Prescott, Ont., received his degree in arts from St. George's University. He studied theology at United Theological College, which is associated with McGill University, and was graduated last spring with the degree of Bachelor of Divinity.
 In June he was ordained by the Montreal and Ottawa conferences and was transferred into the Maritime conference and appointed to Bedford pastoral charge where he began his ministry in July.
 During his seven years of study Mr. Whitney served as student supply within the Dunsmuir-Creville presbytery. In the summer of 1962 he acquired a leave of absence to go to East Hants, the well known Negro area in New York, and it is his experiences there which he will discuss at his Sunday evening service.

Four Face Sentencing In Auto Theft Charges

SUMMERSIDE — Facing separate charges of the theft of an automobile, Eldon Joseph Casey and Norman Earl Gallant of Summerside, Paul Joseph Urban Perry and Paul Ernest Gaudet of Muscouche were arraigned yesterday before Judge W. Chester S. MacDonald in Prince County magistrate's court.
 The charges arose from the theft of a 1963 Chevrolet, the property of Edward Joseph Gallant, Muscouche, on the night of Nov. 10 and the youths pleaded guilty and elected trial by judge.
 A member of the RCMP detachment in Summerside testified that Casey and Gaudet were removed from the parking lot at Muscouche high school and taken to a building where they were fitted with the carburator, spare wheel and other parts had been removed. These parts were found the next day on a car owned by Casey and Gallant.
 The youths had nothing to say in their defence and before adjourning the cases to Nov. 21st, magistrate MacDonald told them they faced a long prison term, up to 16 years, and warned them that as long as they kept silent they would get no sympathy from the court.
 A resident of Graham's Road, Sterling Andrews, was fined \$10 and costs for crossing a solid white line.
 The case of a Charlottetown resident, charged with possession of liquor in a place other than his own residence, was adjourned until Nov. 20.
 The case against Wendell Sherman Francis Grady, Summerside, charged with possession of stolen goods valued at more than the cash and clothing he wore, 19, when his defence counsel, J. Melville Campbell, was unable to be present.
