## The Transvaal War

TOLD BY THE NURSES.

These pathetic little hospital stories—from the life—are from the pen of a nursing sister at the front.

"A comrade of mine, sister, Private Young was. He was going to be married on the strength, when his regiment was ordered to South Africa. He wanted to let her off, but have him she would, dead or alive, she said. Do you know what a woman is, sister, when she loves a man, though he's only a poor private? That was the sort of one Young's girl was, and she'd have made him a wife in a thousand, but for the luck of war.

"Well, sister, they were married Sunday morning; and Sunday night, ten o'clock, Young left his bride and joined his regiment, which sailed at daybreak next morning. Short honeymoon, sister; yes, Young, he came out with me on the troopship, and we were fighting side by side at Magersfontein. I fell wounded, and Young went on fighting them cursed Boers. But he'll never have his own back out of him now, poor chap. I suppose the cowardly shot at him from behind a rock, or under cover of the white flag—it's their only way, sister, you know—for Young's name was among the list of killed at Magersfontein.

"Ah, I am sorry for her, poor girl, when she knows.

"Tired, sister! Yes, tired as a beast, for we'd had a long forced march in the heat, and marching in that country's no play—d'you know what it's like up-country, sister, then?—and we fought for fourteen hours and a half without as much as a biscuit. So when 'twas over, we fell down asleep where we were on the battlefield among the dead and wounded.

"I spread my blanket and slept like a dead man myself, and knew nothing of the cold—the nights are bitter cold—after noise and dust and heat of the day. I've been through active service in Egypt and in India, but God! that was child's play to this. Hell couldn't be worse than Magersfontein.

"Maybe 'twill give you a bit of a turn, sister. I creamed cold all over myself when I woke in the morning and took up my brown blanket—I thought 'twas spread on saddles—and found two dead Boers underneath me!"

Many a nursing sister has written many a last letter for her dying patient. And, alas! many a poor widow has read the familiar words in an unfamiliar writing.

Private White was a Reservist, so he had more ties at home and found less attraction in the field than a Regular. This was the letter I wrote for him:

"My own dear wife,—I was so glad to get your loving letter yesterday. I wish I was at home with you and the boy. I shan't do no more fighting now for this long time. So no more at present from your darling husband, John White."

I stood by the dying bed, and closed the dead eyes not long after. And at daybreak the drums were beating and the volleys were fired in a little cemetery there yonder in the red sand. A tragic little green and white oasis, where lie the English dead. And Kipling's refrain rings in one's memory:

"Hark to the big drums calling  
Follow me, follow me 'ome."

### IN NATAL.

The Boers are making preparations for spending the winter in Natal. They are visiting all their Kiffirs within the occupied sphere, demanding the payment of the hut tax and informing them not to pay to the Natal Government in future, but to them. The Boers are bringing heir stock from the high veldt into Natal for the winter grazing, and have intimidated to the Kiffirs that they require grass for their animals and that the natives must work for them or move south of Sunday's river. Roberts' complaint that some of the British prisoners at Pretoria are lodged in the town goal, says that only those are so treated who have tried or who are suspected of trying to escape. He retorts, moreover, that Boer prisoners are confined in the town goal at Pietermaritzburg with natives

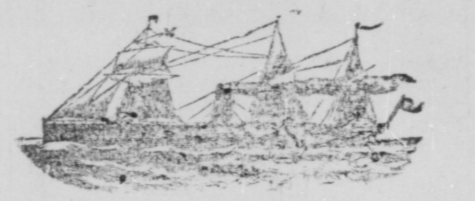
