Irvine, ate a small piece of green apple, and in less than three hours was a corpse, despite the efforts of two physicians. Although he had been in ill health for a few months, the effect of the green fruit, it is thought, was the cause of his death. His parents have the sympathy of the community.

MR. E. C. DAVIDSON, Conductor on the Picton Express, I. C. R., reached his sixtieth birthday on Friday last. He has been nearly half of that time in the I. C. R. employ, nearly twenty-six years of which he has been running as conductor, and has never met with an accident serious enough to disable a man for an hour or interfere with the running of a train. His children, six in number, presented him with a splendid gold-headed cane bearing a suitable inscription.

A NEW KIND OF EXODUS.—The Moncton Transcript says—On Wednesday afternoon sixteen young men from P. E. Island arrived in Moncton and took passage in the night express, en route to a Francisco, California, where they propose pursuing their studies at St. Mary's Roman Catholic College, an institution under the auspices and care of the Christian Brotherhood. On the completion of their studies it is their intention to enter the Ministry of the Roman Catholic Church.

SOME MONEY IN THE COUNTRY.—A strawberry festival and fancy sale at Baie Verte recently, realized \$116 00 in aid of the mission House fund. The ladies of the Baptist church at Parabrook realized \$24 25 at a dinner and sale on the 24th July. At a Methodist tea at Tyne Valley, P. E. Island, on the 23rd July, the receipts were over \$40 00, and a tea at Wellington, P. E. Island, on the 16th, realized \$265 00. It is evident there is yet some money in the country, notwithstanding Grit assertions that it is all being squandered or loaned to the Syndicate.

THE death of Megantic, Q., of Rev. W. Ross, M. A., one of the best known Presbyterian ministers, is announced. He was a Scotchman, and a graduate of Edinburgh University, and went out with the Rev. Thomas Chalmers at the time of the disruption. He then came to Canada, and for many years was settled at Charlottetown, P. E. I. For twelve years he preached at Lochiel, Glengarry, and for the last three years he has had the care of the church at Marabrook. Q. He has been a regular attendant at all the great gatherings of the Church, and was an ex-Moderator of the Synod of Montreal and Ottawa. He married Jane Suther a d, of New Glasgow, N. S.—Kingston Paper.

A. P. E. ISLAND BIGAMIST.—John C. Wood, a native of Prince Edward Island, forty-two years old, was arrested last evening at his boarding place, 92 Summer street, East Boston, by Patrolman Gilbert of station 7, on a warrant charging him with polygamy. It is alleged that Wood some twenty years since took to himself a wife in Nova Scotia. She now resides in Boston with their son, ten years of age. About five years ago Wood, it is said, again entered the bonds of matrimony with a Chelsea woman, who has borne him two children. Wood eventually deserted his Chelsea bride. For some time past he has been employed in the various shipyards in the island district. Both women are complainants against Wood, who will be arraigned before Judge Pond in the district court to-day.—Boston Herald, 30th.

NEW HAMPSHIRE pays a bounty on the killing of woodchucks and crows. The State paid on forty thousand crows last year, and will pay on as many the present year.

At a Democratic barbeque in Lexington, Ky., on the 29th ult., attended by 10,000 persons, 85 oxen, Southdown sheep, and hogs were roasted whole in trenches and served with wagon loads of bread, roast fowls, and vegetables.

FOUND DEAD.—At Demoiselle Creek, Albert Co., N. B., on the 29th ult., an elderly man named Asa Ferris was found dead in his potato field, lying between the rows. He had gone there to pick beetles from the plants. Heart disease is supposed to have been the cause.—Post.

Is the baby-farming case at Toronto the developments are surprising. A dying child was christened as a boy and afterwards found to be a girl, whose attenuated frame was a mass of filth, showing, it is asserted, that the child had never been undressed all the time it was in the establishment.

J. G. COLMER, Secretary of the Canadian Government Offices, London, England, is in Montreal. He states that a large immigration from Ireland, Germany, and Scandinavia to Canada may be looked for. In his opinion the Dominion obtains a much better class of immigrants than Australia.

DR. KOCH, the German cholera expert, who has been visiting infected districts, has submitted his report on the epidemic to Prince Bismarck. Dr. Koch criticizes severely the want of precaution shown by the English government to prevent the spread of the epidemic. Should cholera appear in England, Dr. Koch advised that the strictest measures should be adopted against all vessels sailing from England.

"How glorious it is to be engaged in a purely intellectual occupation!" murmured a Boston maiden, gazing rapturously into the admiring eyes of a country editor; your own mental facilities for tools and the whole universe for a workshop. FROM an orbit calculated by Messrs. Chandler and Kendall at the Harvard College observatory, it appears that the comet discovered by Mr. Barnard at Nashville, Tenn., is approaching the sun. It will pass its perihelion on August 17 at about 130,000,000 miles from the sun. Its distance from the earth is 57,000,000 miles. It is not perceptibly varying, its inclination is very small, and its motion direct—peculiarities which suggest a periodical comet. Its brightness increases slightly, but it will not become visible to the naked eye.

THE CAMPAIGN.

Meeting at Mount Stewart

Strongly Liberal-Conservative

MOUNT STEWART, August 2. The meeting held here last night was large considering the short notice, and very orderly.

Both candidates were warmly received. The meeting was addressed by Messrs. Jenkins, Welsh, Ferguson, and Davies.

The discussion was kept until half-past twelve o'clock. The feeling was strongly Liberal-Conservative.

No vote was taken.

China Refuses an Indemnity.

LONDON, Aug. 1. The Times has a despatch from Foo Chow, dated July 31, which says "China refuses to pay the indemnity demanded by France. France has extended the time till the fourth of August. War, at all appearances, is imminent. The China merchant fleet has been sold to an American firm for nearly \$7,300,000.

A Life Sentence.

LONDON, Aug. 1. The trial of the dynamiters, at Warwick, was brought to a conclusion to-day. McDonnell, who pleaded guilty to the charge of treason felony, was released to appear at any times called upon. James Egan was sentenced to penal servitude for twenty years, and John Daly for life.

Sunk in Collision.

LONDON, Aug. 2. The steamer Britannia, from New York for London, has been sunk in collision. She collided with the Belcairn, which was bound for Cadiz. The Belcairn rescued the crew of the Britannia, and landed them at Southampton.

Cholera on Shipboard.

LONDON, Aug. 1. It is reported from Cardiff that a man had died of cholera on board the French steamer Draville, from Marseilles, which is lying at anchor at Penarth Roads. The body was thrown overboard. Another on board the ship is ill.

Cholera Slowly Dying Out.

PARIS, Aug. 2. Cholera is slowly dying out at Marseilles and Toulon, but has made its appearance in several new places. It is reported there are seventeen cases at Pancalet, Italy.

The Greely Relief Squadron.

PORTSMOUTH, N. H., Aug. 1. The Alert, the Tit, and Bear, of the Greely relief squadron, arrived this morning. There will be a grand Naval reception this afternoon.

Strike Ending.

LONDON, Aug. 1. Five thousand striking miners at St. Helen's have resumed work.

LISBON, July 31. The port of Huelva, Spain, is infected with cholera.
