Farming Activities

Fine dry weather has facilitated the harvesting of the potato crop and many farmers are now working at the turnip harvest. So far there seems to be no very satisfactory substitute for bending the back and trimming with a knife. Some are topped with a hoe and harrowed out. This method reduces the labor, but it is not so convenient for picking up in some instances the potato digger is used to advantage. Machines, very expensive ones to be sure, have been developed for the harvesting of sugar beets and are claimed to do quite a good job.

From the standpoint of labor, turnips are an expensive crop to grow, but nevertheless a very valuable one for feeding cattle. While the turnip maggot has cut down exports it will likely be responsible for our dairy cows having some extra feed this winter.

Feeding Potatoes

The large crop and low price for potatoes this year will result in many farmers attempting to utilize a portion of the crop for feed. There is no question that cooked potatoes when properly balanced with protein supplements can be used to advantage in producing bacon, although possibly not of a high quality as the barley fed product.

In regard to the feeding of raw potatoes to dairy cattle, livestock men have different opinions. Some claiming very satisfactory results and others the direct opposite. We believe that if small amounts are fed in the beginning and increased gradually that results should be satisfactory.

It is necessary, however, that the dairy cow receives sufficient grain and hay to maintain body weight.

It is important to keep in mind that raw potatoes fed before milking can produce an objectionable flavour in the milk.

The Experimental Station has a bulletin which gives information on the making of potato sludge. Potato sludge is claimed to compare favourably with cooked potatoes as a feed.

Farmers And Hunters

A letter in the press on Thursday morning from Senator Hatfield asks why there should be any secrecy in giving the details in reference to the Federal Government's plan to assist the potato industry.

At the time the press release referred to was made, no official information on the proposition was available. However, we learn from a reliable source that the Dominion Government is prepared to match on an equal basis any assistance the Province might provide.

We can see some difficulties for any Province in a plan of this kind and it would appear unreasonable to expect Prince Edward Island and New Brunswick to assist in stabilizing the potato market for Ontario and Quebec.

Potatoes are a widely used and important food and we do not feel that the average consumer expects to buy them far below the cost of production. A loss to one section of our people can not be a permanent benefit to anyone.

We understand that the Prince Edward Island Potato Board plans to meet with the New Brunswick Board the last of this week to plan the setting of minimum prices.

This is an action which must be taken jointly and is not practical for one Province independent of another.

Farm Forum Groups

The first regular broadcast of the Farm Forum season will be heard on Monday, October 30th. Increased interest in this field of Adult Education is highly desirable, and we look for increased and renewed interest in this field of endeavour.

Beaverbrook in Optimistic Mood

MONTREAL, Oct. 26—(CP)—A tanned and cheerful Lord Beaverbrook arrived in Montreal Wednesday to greet the fifth anniversary of the United Nations with the comment: "It is a new United Nations, thanks to its inspired action in Korea."

Accompanied by his grand-daughter, Lady Jeanne Campbell, the distinguished Canadian-born British publisher was in an optimistic and cheerful mood as he alighted from his private railway car here.

He will stay in Montreal until Thursday, when he will travel to Bishop's University at Lennoxville, Que., to be honored with a doctorate of civil law.

Honored with similar degrees at the annual convocation will be Lieutenant-Governor Lawson of Ontario, Finance Minister Abbott, Montreal industrialist Sir James Dunn and Robert Sherwood, Pulitzer-prize-winning American playwright.

Lord Beaverbrook, in a brief interview, said "Canada is leading the world on the road to liberty" by freeing the dollar. He added that it was his hope that the British pound would soon be similarly set free.

"If this is done," he said, "the value of the pound will improve at once and the English people will have a higher standard of living."

As the publisher of the world's largest daily newspaper, the London Daily Express, Lord Beaverbrook predicted that newspaper prices, which now are on the increase, will likely go as high as \$120 a ton.

Three Canadian newspaper manufacturers recently announced a \$10 increase to \$110 a ton.
