Juvenile Game At Montague

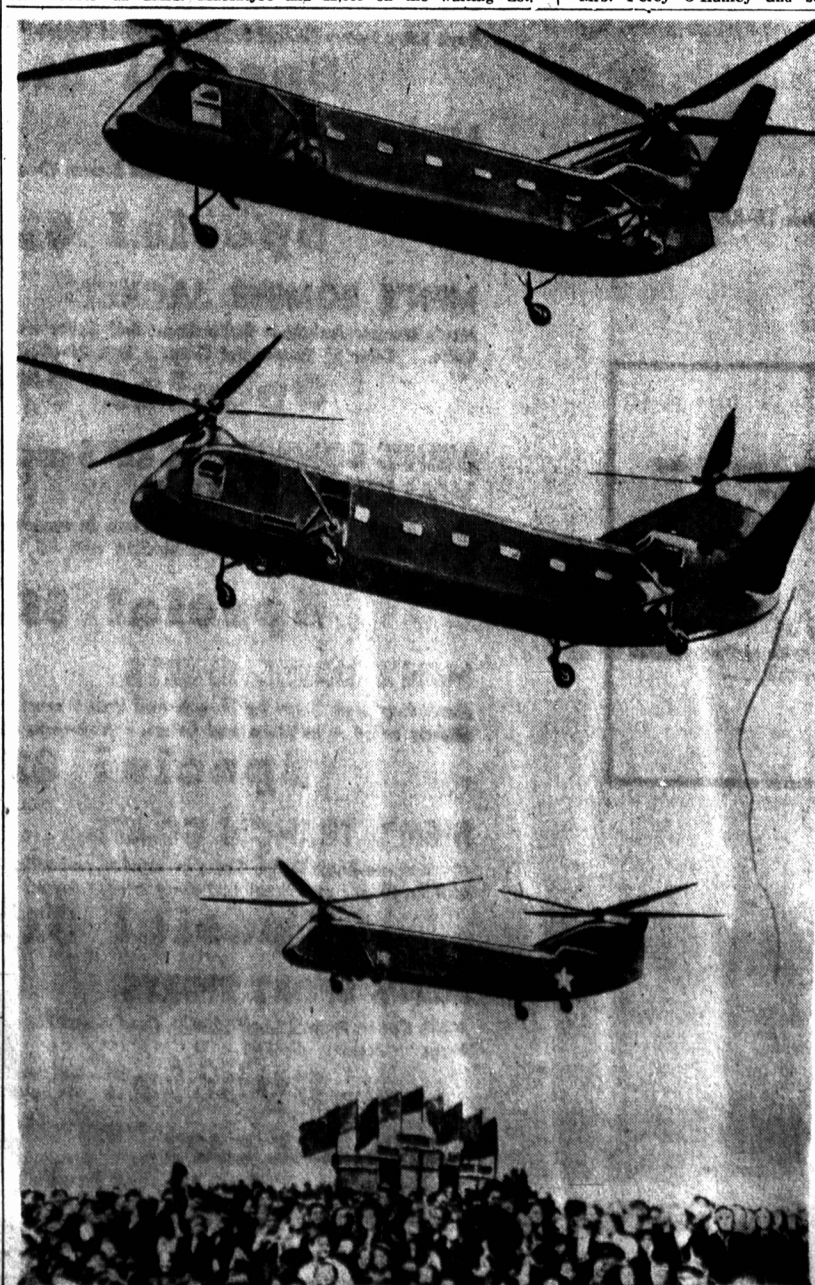

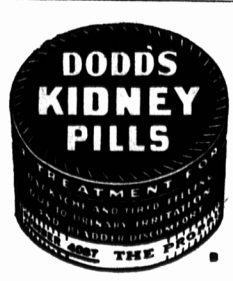
