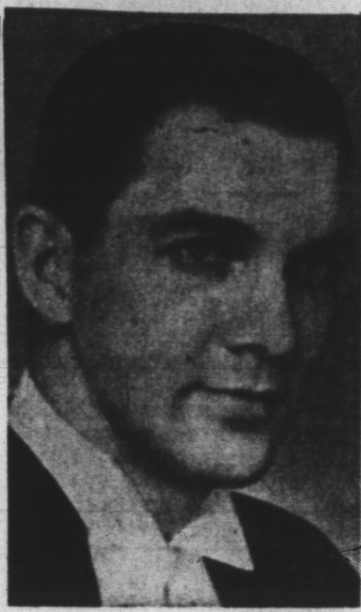
Waterford Lady Passes At Home

From a summary of these records books, plans for next year may be able to be made. That is to say, if one portion of the business is slipping, perhaps plans can be made to improve it.

Most of your machinery will be idle until the spring. It would be well for this machinery to be cleaned and lubricated so as to prevent excessive rusting. Many farmers find it necessary to leave machinery outside all year. Machinery not given some protection from the elements will certainly suffer.

Don't wait until late spring to plan next season's work. Plan to order your lime and fertilizer to avoid the last minute rush in the late spring. Then too, don't forget seed cleaning. The seed cleaner operator can do a better job when he is not rushed. Although it is a little early to mention some of these things, it would be well to keep them in mind.

INCORPORATION

As farms of the future continue to increase in size, capital investment, and operating turnover, more and more of them will be incorporated. However, incorporation is not a magic formula. Each farm family, with the help of their lawyer and accountant, should weigh good and bad points. Most of the corporate advantages belong to large farms. The greatest advantage is that the company has perpetual existence and it provides a handy method of transfer from one generation to the next. Chances are also better than an incorporated farm will be operated in a more businesslike and profitable manner. Capital may be easier to obtain, either from outside agencies or through the pooling of farm resources. Under certain conditions income tax may be lowered. Incorporation offers advantages in the way of limited liability. An expensive liability suit might break the company but the creditors would not be allowed to seize personal assets outside of the farm company to square off the debt.

It should be pointed out that there are disadvantages to incorporation which should not be overlooked. The initial cost may range from \$300 to well over \$1,000 on some family sized farms. There are also legal requirements and records which must be attended to from year to year in the company operations. It is a complicated matter to dissolve a company should the shareholders wish to do so. Unforeseen tax disadvantages may result and a minority shareholder may be put in a difficult position should he wish to withdraw.
