WIPED OUT BY FIRE. - The village of Bay of Islands, a settlement on the western coast of Newfoundland, was destroyed by fire on Monday. Sixty-nine houses were burned and fifty-seven families rendered homeless.

FROM MONTREAL. - The steamer Greeting arrived from Montreal yesterday afternoon about five o'clock, and left this morning at eight for the Sydneys and St. John's, Nfld. She had a miscellaneous freight aboard. Her outward cargo included horses, cattle and sheep on deck and produce under deck.

A FATAL FIRE. - A fire attended by fatal results to human life occurred at Sherbrooke, N. S., on Sunday afternoon. About three o'clock flames were seen issuing from a dwelling occupied by Isaac Paris, Gull-entville, and before assistance could be had from the village, some three miles distant, the building was totally destroyed, together with its contents; no insurance. His mother, a blind woman of some 90 years, perished in the flames, though every possible effort was made to rescue her.
