P. R. (Dick) Sandwell, bespectacled, six-foot engineering consultant working out of his Vancouver headquarters, exports Canadian talent to any point in the world where a pulp mill is to be constructed.

Sandwell and Co. Ltd., is currently engaged in projects on three continents, largest of which is the Murupara mill of the Tasman Pulp and Paper Co., Ltd., New Zealand.

The construction bill on that one has been estimated at \$40,000,000. It was designed on West Georgia street in downtown Vancouver.

Strange But True

Even among the decently educated there are few who can speak and write the English language correctly. In my own case I never bother worrying about syntax and grammar. I just put my thoughts on paper and let them go at that; for when you write two thousand words every day one simply does not have the time to iron out difficult points.

There seems to be no logical reason for joining an and other. An here excludes any other article; and analogy and consistency require that the words be separated. Their union sometimes leads to an improper repetition of the article; as, "Another such a man" for "another such man." How many of us observe the rule?

Another case in point: when adjectives are connected, and the qualities belong to things individually different, though of the same name, the article should be repeated; as, "A black and a white cow." Most of us say a "black and white cow."

And few of us remember that adjectives that imply unity of plurality must agree with their nouns in number; as "That sort"; "those sorts." There are few writers or speakers who do not say "Those sort of persons." Indeed this expression is so common that we seldom notice the error. It is not always easy to determine whether an adjective or adverb is required. In considering their usage we ought to ponder the case in question whether quality or manner is to be expressed; if the former, an adjective is proper; if the latter, an adverb. The following examples will illustrate this point: "She looks cold; — she looks coldly on him." "Stand firm; — maintain your cause firmly" etc.

Too, we frequently forget that either and neither relate to two things only. When more are referred to, any and none should be used instead of them; example: "Any of the three" — not "Either of the three."

The words which, who, whom, and that, are thrown into most of our speeches and writings in a manner that would make Lindley Murray and other grammarians turn over in their graves. But how could it be otherwise when we are told it is proper to say "Our Father, which art in heaven," or "Our Father who are in heaven."

If we don't happen to know the sex of the little child who died down the street, we are told to say or write it thus: "The little child which died."
