

Begin Investigation Into Crash Of MCA Aircraft

MONT JOLI, Que. (CP)—An investigation was launched Thursday into the crash of a four-engine Maritime Central Airways plane in northern Quebec which claimed the lives of two of three crew members aboard.

The huge transport, engaged in Distant Early Warning radar line work, crashed Wednesday near Fort Chimo, Que., about 800 miles north of Quebec City.

Killed were Second Captain Ian John Christie of Calgary and co-pilot Peter John Crighton of Thornhill, Ont. The plane's captain, pilot R. J. Rushbrooke of Fredericton, survived. He escaped with minor injuries after being thrown clear of the craft.

The aircraft—an Avro York—went down in wilderness about 10 miles from where famed flyer-of-fortune Whitey Dahl lost his life in another crash last spring.

ENGINE FAILED

The plane was on a routine return flight from Frobisher Bay and crashed about 40 miles north of the refueling base at Fort Chimo.

It carried no passengers.

An RCAF spokesman in Halifax said that before the crash the plane reported difficulty when its number three engine failed. The pilot radioed that he planned to land at Fort Chimo.

The spokesman added that something else apparently went wrong.

The crash was first reported by another Maritime Central Airways plane which spotted the burning wreckage. A helicopter and a single-engine Norseman were sent to the scene from Fort Chimo.

A rescue plane from Mont Joli was also dispatched to the scene.

W. F. Gaudet, personnel manager for the Airways at Mont Joli, said the bodies of the victims were found in the wreckage.

"They will be flown to their respective homes," Mr. Gaudet said.

Highway Officials Conclude Conference

J. F. O'Neill, Assistant Deputy Minister, Department of Highways, Newfoundland, was elected Chairman of the Eastern Canada Association of Highway Officials at the concluding session of the third annual conference yesterday morning in the Charlottetown Hotel.

The session opened with group meetings at which papers were read by leaders in specific fields. "Mechanical Equipment used in Bridge Construction" was dealt with by W. A. Landry, Assistant Mechanical Engineer, Department of Highways of Nova Scotia, who stressed the need of speedy production today as compared with some few years ago when the work was handled more or less by manual labour.

"Today when the demand is for bigger and better bridges, the old-fashioned method of handling materials causes all highway officials a great deal of concern," Mr. Landry said. "By far the largest percentage of bridges being built in Nova Scotia are of the reinforced concrete type. In recent years the Bridge Department has seen fit to order their reinforcing steel in large quantities and stock pile it.

"This steel is often cut to lengths and delivered to the bridge site by Mechanical Branch personnel. We have also been stock piling a quantity of 30 and 33" wide flange girders of pre-determined length. When the abutment and piers are complete the Mechanical Branch delivers to the site and erects these girders. Standardized bridge railings are on a recently developed program," Mr. Landry said.

"In Nova Scotia we are faced with the difficult problem of maintaining a great many old steel bridges, which is enhanced by the tremendous traffic using the roads and bridges," Mr. Landry described in detail the set-up under which the province is divided into three districts with fully equipped mobile crews on call night and day.

BAILEY BRIDGING in Halifax is stock piling enough Bailey bridging to handle many minor out-breaks of traffic disruption due to bridge failures," Mr. Landry said. "We can place a Bailey bridge in service within forty-eight hours after being notified that it is to be erected. Some eight Bailey bridges have been erected in Nova Scotia from 160' D. D. to 90' T. S. and I feel that they are quite capable of doing credit to any Army Unit with respect to Bailey crews."

"Unqualified cooperation between Mechanical Equipment and Bridge Departments have been the key to successful results in our Bridge Program," Mr. Landry concluded.

PSYCHIATRISTS GATHER For Maritime Meeting
Scientific and business sessions of the second annual Maritime Psychiatric Association meetings began this morning at the Y.M.C.A. building when Dr. J.C. Theriault, president of the M.P.A., welcomes delegates from the four Atlantic Provinces. Among the representatives will be such well-known Maritime psychiatrists as Dr. R. O. Jones, Professor of psychiatry at Dalhousie University, Dr. Murray MacKay, superintendent of the Nova Scotia Hospital, Dr. Robert Prosser, director of mental health for New Brunswick and Dr. Robert Gregory, superintendent of Lancaster Hospital, Fairville, N.B.

Dr. A.T. Murchison, Director of Division of Mental Health (P.E.I.) will open the scientific program with an evaluation of the laboratory program in Prince Edward Island.

This program, inaugurated in 1953, has for the most part been successful. No patient undergoing such a surgical procedure has suffered a setback because of it and indeed many have been able to leave the institution and become gainfully employed.

The operation, which severs certain brain fibres, is relatively safe. It aims at controlling or modifying undesirable behaviour. Dr. W.D. Stevenson, neuro surgeon from Halifax, performs these operations.

Train Crew Exonerated At Coroner's Inquest
