The Telephone Company P. E. ISLAND.

PARTIES using the telephones would find
taking much more satisfactory if they
would observe the following rules:
1st. Speak with the mouth about four inches
from the transmitter.
2nd. Speak in a moderate tone of voice, not too
loud and distinctly.
3rd. Place the telephone so as to cover the ear,
just as if you wished to shut out all other sounds.
Do not press too hard on the ear.
It is possible to talk and be heard when stand-
ing back two or three feet from the transmitter,
if you speak loud enough, but it is not a pleasant
mode of conversation, is entirely unnecessary,
and is a useless waste of wind and lungs, besides
being very annoying to all within range of your
voice.

Notes and Comments.

—Work is to be begun at once upon the
Chignecto Ship Railway, to the end that it
may be opened for next fall's traffic.
—So rapid has been the progress made
in the work of compiling the census re-
turns this year under Mr. George John-
son's direction, that in a very few weeks
time it is expected the entire work will
have been completed. Fourteen members
of the census staff have received notice
that their services would not be required
after this week.
—The department of agriculture has re-
ceived copies of the latest imperial order
affecting the landing of cattle in Great
Britain. It provides that no steamer shall
carry Canadian cattle to Great Britain
which has had United States cattle on
board within 21 days of the Canadian cat-
tle being shipped.
—According to reports received by the
finance department at Ottawa, produc-
tiveness in Great Britain state that the
quality of Canadian cheese marketed there
last year was considerably above that of
other years, although previous qualities
had been excellent. The high standing of
the Canadian product is in marked con-
trast to the inferior cheese of the United
States.
—Mr. Gladstone in the Nineteenth Century
reviews the rise and progress of the platform,
since the Gordon Riots in 1790, and also
deals with the relation of the platform to
the press in the political field from the time
of the Reform Bill of 1832. He believes the
platform has been the stronger influence, but
he says "let not the press tremble for its
pre-eminence. The platform, indeed, both
displays and generates living energy. It
quickens sympathy, besides increasing in-
formation, and it brings to bear the whole
power of fellowship in a cause. Yet it is in
the main an occasional and intermittent
power, while the action of the press is con-
tinuous and permanent as that of old time."

—From a return brought down to Par-
liament last week it appears that 2,626
petitions, with 364,898 signatures, have
been received in favor of a prohibitory
liquor law, and also 11 petitions from
societies. By provinces the returns show:
Ontario, 1,576 petitions, 191,737 signa-
tures; Quebec, 197 petitions, 17,158 signa-
tures; New Brunswick, 262 petitions,
26,559 signatures; Nova Scotia, 336 peti-
tions, 43,738 signatures; Prince Edward
Island, 113 petitions, 13,101 signatures;
Manitoba, 88 petitions, 7,395 signatures;
British Columbia, 21 petitions, 2,533 signa-
tures; Northwest Territories, 28 petitions,
3,587 signatures. Some of these petitions
contained over 3,750 signatures and ex-
ceeded seventy-five feet in length.

tional part of a cent expended upon it for mere
appearance. It is neither wrapped in tin foil
nor worked into fancy shapes, nor put in
fancy cases, nor subject to any kind of expense
merely to please the eye or captivate the
fancy. The manufacturers rightly believe
that tobacco was not purchased for ornament,
but for smoking, and therefore all extraneous
expense was avoided and added to the quality
of the tobacco. The public have testified in
its case that they prefer paying their money
for a high quality of article than for ornament
out of place.
