

# Heart Stopped Half Hour But Boy, 4, Is Recovering

SYDNEY, Australia (CP) — A boy whose heart stopped for half an hour on the operating table of a Sydney hospital had it massaged and "returned from the dead."

The boy, Robert Goff, 4, of Newcastle, is recovering in the Royal Alexandra Hospital for Children, Camperdown, Sydney.

The hospital's congenital heart disease clinic released details of the heart stop.

The surgeon who was operating on the boy for a blocked artery said: "There have been many recorded cases of a heart stopping during an operation, but in only a few has massage been successful. "Often the patient does not survive more than a few days. This is the first case in my experience where the heart has stopped on the operating table for as long as half an hour, and the patient has made a successful recovery."

The danger in these cases is that if it stops for more than say, two minutes the loss of blood circulation can cause serious damage to the brain.

"There has been no indication of brain damage in this case, as hand massage kept the blood circulating until the heart could take over the job again."

Robert Goff was born with a blockage of the pulmonary artery where it leaves the heart and without the operation would not have lived more than another two years.

Residents in this area who have completed contracts with the Maritime Electric Company Limited are hereby advised to wire their premises.

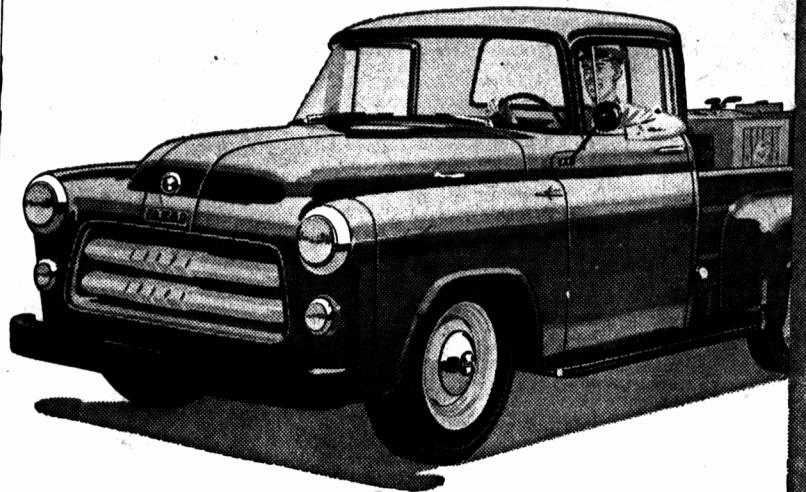

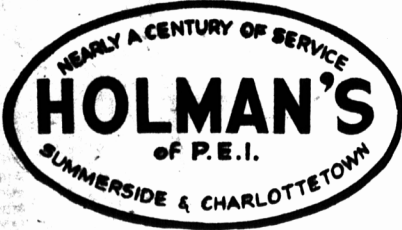
