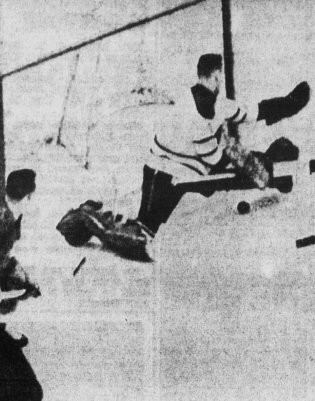

Wings Edge Toronto; Sackville Dooms Winner

DETROIT (CP) — The goal by captain Alex Delvecchio with only 17 seconds remaining in regulation time gave Detroit Red Wings a 4-3 Stanley Cup win over Toronto Maple Leafs Thursday night and boosted them one game ahead, after three games in the series.

Less than one minute earlier Don McKenney had tied it for the Leafs and seemed to set the stage for overtime. But Delvecchio, a giant around goalie Johnny Bower with linemate Gordie Howe, grabbed a loose puck and jammed a short one home in front of Detroit's Olympic crowd of 15,065.

The Red Wings gave the Leafs a skating anklecheck in the second period, and dominated play for the best part of the game, leading up a 3-1 lead by the end of the second period.

The Leafs staged one of their famous last-period drives on goal by Dave O'Brien and McKenney, but they failed in the last minute and allowed the Wings to take command.

Bower had just made a save on Howe and was trying to retrace the puck when Detroit's left wing, Ed Snider, who had been trying tip-ins all night, finally scored at 18:47 when, Tim Horton shot from the center of the blueline. Sawchuk did not appear to see the puck which exploded to McKenney about 10 feet in front.

For the third time in the final series, the course of the game was decided in the last minute of regulation time. In the first game in Toronto Saturday, Bob Pulford won it on a power-play goal in the second period. In the second game in Detroit on Tuesday, Gerry Emlahn tied it for Toronto at 19:17 to send it into overtime when Detroit won 4-3.

Howe had his best game of the series and the line of Norm Ullman, Larry Jeffrey and Smith kept control of the puck for most of the time the net was on the ice.
