QUICK DISPATCH.—The str. William discharged yesterday at Connelly's Wharf over 1,800 bbls of flour and loaded nearly 1,000 bags of potatoes before dark. She proceeded this morning to West River for part cargo, and will finish loading here and sail to-morrow for New York. She is being loaded with potatoes by the owner, F. T. Newbery and others.

NEWFOUNDLAND NEWS.—It is rumored at St. John's that the government intend making American fishing vessels deposit one thousand dollars cash instead of bonds to prevent the exportation of bait to St. Pierre, Mig.

The report that the Pelican's boats had been fired upon by Newfoundland fishermen is pronounced false by the British naval authorities.

It is announced that Admiral Watson has received orders from the Imperial authorities to hold himself in readiness to proceed to Newfoundland if necessary.

FOR BOSTON.—The steamer Carroll, Captain Brown, sailed for Boston about half-past six o'clock last evening with a cargo which included 2200 bags potatoes, 500 cases eggs, 180 oil barrels, 800 bags starch, and 88 packages of general merchandise. Her passenger list was made up as follows: Mrs. Carey, J. Carey, S. Carey, Emma Carey, Mary Murphy, Frank Taylor, Mrs. Frank Taylor, Mrs. C. Cairns, J. Egan, Maggie Scott, Mrs. F. G. Lillyman, George Vaughan and A. Henry. The Carroll is expected here on return next Wednesday fortnight.

THE FISHERIES.—Official advices from the bureau at Halifax, (May 6) are as follows: The herring are plentiful and the lobster fishing is good at Perce, Que. The lobster fishing is also good at Grand R'vier, but the herring is poor. At Caraquet, N. B., the herring fishing is fair. In P. E. I. a few lobsters are being taken at Tignish, Alberton, Morningside and North Cape. The drift ice is still preventing fishing at Meat Cove and Ingonish, C. B., but at St. Anne's herring are reported plentiful and lobsters at St. Peters. At Arichat, C. B., lobster fishing is p-or. Lobsters are fairly plentiful at Whitehead, N. S., and good at Isaac's Harbor.

TWO FIRES.—About eleven o'clock last night fire was discovered in the stable of Mr. Arthur Newman, in the rear of his premises, Grafton Street, near Medical Hall Corner. The fire, which was well under way when discovered, was checked by the firemen in double quick time after they got to work, not however, before the stable was completely gutted and all the hay and straw therein destroyed. At one time it seemed as if the workshop and stable of Mr. I. W. Wadman, adjoining would be also destroyed, and the horses, cows and everything therein was promptly removed by the Salvage Corps and citizens. Beyond a severe scorching and some damage to the contents by water, however, no harm was done. The horses, cows, &c., in Mr. Newman's stable were also promptly removed. Among the horses in Mr. Newman's stable was Mr. George Tweedy's valuable stallion, "Lucky Harry." The origin of the fire is unknown. Mr. Newman's loss in the neighborhood of between \$300 and \$500. We understand that he has no insurance.

The alarm about six yesterday afternoon was the result of a spark from the chimney of a house on the corner of Prince and King streets setting fire to some shingles on the roof. The firemen, as usual, promptly responded to the call, but their assistance was fortunately not required.

Another War with the Boers in South Africa.

20,000 Boers Under Arms.

LONDON, May 8.
In the House of Commons yesterday the Minister of War said that troops were being sent to British Bechuanaland to oppose the Boers. Recent advices say that 20,000 well-armed Boers propose to cross the Limpopo and proclaim the Republic of the North. Another little war in South Africa is thus threatened. It will require many more British troops than are now available in South Africa to cope with the Boers, who are dead shots and capable of suffering the severest hardships.

ITALY AND GERMANY.
THE KAIZER ANXIOUS BUT COOL.

LONDON, May 8.
Berlin advices say that the Cabinet and Kaiser of Germany view with very great anxiety the attempt of the Italian Government to effect a rapprochement between France and Italy on the one hand and with Russia on the other. There is a feeling that Italy cannot now be depended on in respect to the triple alliance. This is indicated by the coolness with which the Kaiser trusts the Italian Ambassador.

Civil War in Honduras.

Rebel General Killed.

LONDON, May 8.
General Barbeles, the Rebel leader in the Honduras revolt, has been killed in a recent unsuccessful attempt on the Government forces. There was great loss of life.

Against Parnell.

MONTREAL, May 8.
The Catholic clergy of Montreal yesterday renewed their denunciation of the Parnellite meeting, explaining that the Archbishop's mandament was not merely an exhortation, but a command, not to attend to-night's meeting.

A Lumber Fire.

NEW YORK, May 8.
A fire in the yards of the Export Lumber Co. at Hunter's Point, N. Y., destroyed several hundred thousand dollars' worth of heavily insured lumber, which will be replaced by Canadian stock.

Animals and Their Produce.

Exports. 1889. 1890.
To Great Britain... \$16,227,060 \$18,578,720
To United States... 7,137,006 5,966,474
This shows an increase of \$2,350,000 sent to the Mother Country and a decrease of \$1,100,000 to the United States. There was also a decrease of \$1,600,000 in the export of agricultural produce to the States, much more than made up, however, by the addition to the total volume of our exports to Great Britain, which amounted to \$48,353,694, as compared with \$38,105,126 in 1889. These figures seem to show that our strong hope lies in trade with the Mother Country.
