WASHINGTON, June 13. The Star says that recent disclosures show the failure of the banking house of Middleton & Co. to be one of the most disgraceful and disastrous on record. Property left for safe keeping, a good margin on stock, charity funds, all of the deposits, and, in fact, everything has been swept away and used by the firm, until it is doubtful if it will pay a cent or even a mill on the dollar.

LONDON, June 13. At a meeting of the National Artillery Association in London yesterday, the Marquis of Londonderry stated that the Association was in hopes the full amount necessary to send a detachment of twenty-three officers and men to Canada would soon be subscribed.

Fatal Explosion.

LITTLE ROCK, Ark., June 13. An explosion to-day at Loomis Mills, three miles north of this city, destroyed most of the structure, killing Anderson, carpenter, and Elias Leo, and badly wounding two others.

Oil in India.

LONDON, June 13. The Indian Government has decided to procure boring machinery, owing to the discovery of an oil bearing strata in Sindh, and to develop the resources of that region.
