A ROAD QUESTION—A large and representative meeting of the inhabitants of Southport and vicinity was held on Friday evening last in Southport Schoolhouse to consider a proposition to connect the Hillsboro Bridge with the main road leading to Eldon. It had been announced that project No. 36 was for a road leading through Bunbury rather than along the main road through Southport. Strong objection was expressed to appropriating a portion of the Highways grant for the Bunbury road and the following committee was appointed to wait upon the Premier and Commissioner of Public Works on Wednesday 10th at 10 a.m. to place the matter before them: Messrs W. K. Rogers, William Owen, Samuel Wood, George MacDonald, Ewen Martin, A. H. Burke, Charles Stewart, James Trainor, Arthur Burke, Percy Mutch, A. K. McNeill and Dr. Leo Frank. An invitation was forwarded to Hon. David MacDonald and Mr. Peter Brodie to be present.

SERIOUS FIRE—Mr. William Campbell of Montague, had his barn burned yesterday morning. The fire, it is supposed, caught by lightning, as there was a slight storm about that time. Four horses, four cows, about all his live stock, threshing and cleaning outfit, and all his feed and seed were destroyed. All that was saved of the outfit were three cows. As there was only \$500.00 insurance on the building, the loss was very heavy. The barn was wired up with electric lights, but the current was not on at the time, so the fire could not have caught from that source, and it is supposed it caught from the lightning. The fire was first noticed at 2.30 a.m. by Mr. William Wright, who lives near Mr. Campbell. The neighbors were attracted by telephone and soon a crowd gathered. They saved three cows, one flock of hens, but practically nothing else, so that the loss will amount to several thousand dollars. The poultry house adjoining the barn had the roof burned off, and another barn close by had a narrow escape from destruction.

but no provincial money could be found for that worthy purpose. "Money was scarce," the Premier said, and he might well have added "after the incorporators and indemnity grabbers had been paid." These are, of course, a first charge upon the treasury under the Bell government.

It will be seen from what is above set down that things which may not lawfully or honorably be done by members of the House and which if done by them individually, would put them out of the House, become lawful and honorable if they are incorporated. Under these circumstances why don't they all incorporate themselves and then let all the contracts for works and supplies to themselves? They have the power to do it. And it would be all so lawful and honorable! Wait till you see them next year, reader! The incorporators have tasted blood, and we all know what follows.

roy." The impression formed at the time was that whether Mr. Beer knew anything or all about it (the Charlottetown Picton service) we could not, under the circumstances, be being confined to his bed—obtain any information from him and we must look to Mr. Pomeroy for it. We are quite satisfied the messenger delivered the message correctly and as we were to apply elsewhere for the information wanted it did not matter to us whether Mr. Beer knew or not. We accordingly conferred with Mr. Pomeroy, who very courteously advised us to consult Mr. Higgins, Secretary of the Board of Trade as the latter had the correspondence in his office. This was a week or ten days ago. We accordingly called, up Mr. Higgins who very kindly informed us that as far as he could gather from the correspondence the matter of awarding the contract had apparently not been decided but that the department expressed itself as "committed" to the Magdalen. We also consulted others with practically the same result. The only question in dispute here between the Guardian and Mr. Beer is that in our editorial we quoted Mr. Beer as stating on Friday last when the editorial in question was being written, that
