LONDON HOUSE.

LONDON, May 31. The Constantinople correspondent of the Manchester Guardian says the Turkish newspapers have been instructed to raise the bugbear of a religious war, and the wholesale massacre of Christians is likely to follow any attempt at coercion in the direction of reforms, to give a color to the idea of resistance. The language of newspapers need cause no apprehension, as the populace sympathize with the mission of Mr. Goschen, British special ambassador. In the Commons, to-day, Sir Charles Dilke said the Government does not intend to resume communications with Persia relative to Herat. At the same time they were desirous of placing Herat under stable and peaceful rule. A new journal, the St. James Gazette, under the authorship of Frederick Greenwood, late of the Pall Mall Gazette, appeared to-day. Its first article is a strong condemnation of enfranchisement of agricultural labor, which it says "is not a leap in the dark, but in broad daylight down a precipice." At a meeting of 70 Liberals, yesterday, it was decided that another memorial will be sent to Mr. Gladstone, stating that a very strong feeling exists among many members of the Liberal party that Sir Bartle Frere should be recalled from the Cape. The Standard's Constantinople despatch says the district of Bagdad is assuming serious proportions. The Arabs demand self-government under the protection of England.

And no net may be set within 200 yards of the outside of the entrance or inlet to any pond, nor within 50 yards inside thereof, nor in or across any part of such inlet,—under penalties of the Act."

CITY OF MEXICO, May 30. Congress closes its sessions on May 31, immediately after which, it is stated, the following changes will take place in the Cabinet: Gen. Ignacio Mejia, Minister of War. Mr. Romero, Minister of Hacienda. Gen. R. Palicio, Minister of Finance. Gen. Pacheca (the present War Minister) is to be placed in high military command in the adjoining State. The impression now prevails that Gonzales will be the next President.

MISCELLANEOUS DESPACHES. Latest Leadville advices state that the strike is about ended, and there is no likelihood of violence to-day, when the men at the Chrysolite, Little Pittsburg and Little Chief mines are to resume work at the old rates. The insurrection at Burmah is making little headway. The great Council of Ulemas has decided that Colonel Commeroff's assassin shall not be executed, and that the European intervention with the administration of Turkey will not be accepted. The military preparations against the Rumpu rebellion are progressing, says a Calcutta despatch, and there is ever possibility of another tedious campaign in that fever-stricken district. The Indian Government have never entertained any notion of annexation, re-purchase, or any other measure affecting the political status of Cashmere. Bismarck, irritated at the prospect of the defeat of the Church Bill, is reported to be preparing further correspondence throwing light upon the past negotiations with the curia for publication. William and Richard Heffron, of New York, Sunday night accidentally fell over the bank near the suspension bridge, Niagara Falls, on the Canadian side. William was killed, and Richard badly injured.

ALLEY vs. DUCHEMIN.—In the Court of Chancery, to-day, the Vice Chancellor read Master of the Rolls' decision in the case of Alley vs. Duchemin, making the injunction perpetual, to restrain the defendants and each of them, their workmen, employes (and servants from running and conducting their trade and business set forth in the complainant's bill of complaint, and operating their steam factory situate on premises adjacent to the complainants property in such manner as shall in any way diminish the complainant's comfortable enjoyment of his dwelling house and premises, either by tremulous motion, shaking, thumping or otherwise, or by the promotion of physical discomfort, or by causing sounds, rattling or other disagreeable noises, and the defendant to pay the complainant his cost of the suit. Mr. Hodgson, counsel for the defendants, gave notice of an appeal.

OBITUARY.—With feelings of sorrow we have to record the death of Thomas Corley, who departed this life on the 23rd ult., aged 79 years. Mr. Corley was born in Killamurray, County Monaghan, Ireland, and emigrated to this Island in the ship "Agitator," May, 1830. He had been in failing health for over three years, during which time he bore his sickness with Christian resignation. Being fully aware that his mortal career was drawing to a close, he made due preparation, and was frequently attended by the consoling visits of the pastor of his Church, Rev. Allan J. McDonald, who administered to him the last Sacraments. The deceased is universally regretted by his numerous friends and neighbors, being always regarded as an honest, upright, good, obliging neighbor. On Thursday morning, 25th ult., his remains were taken from his late residence, Fort Augustus, to the Parish Church, where a solemn Mass of Requiem was offered for his soul. After the funeral services were performed, his remains were followed to the Cemetery by a respectable concourse of mourners, and respectfully interred. May his soul rest in peace. Amen.—Com.

LOST AT SEA.—Mr. Koughan, Shipping Master, handed us the following extract from the log of the brig "Arthur," taken on April 20th, while in latitude 49° 55', longitude 24° 23':—"Blowing a moderate gale with high sea. Mate being on deck at the time, took the wheel and sent the men John Johnston and William Christian to cast the reef out of the fore-topsail. While on the yard, the man Johnston being on the weather side, the vessel giving a heavy lurch to windward—he (Johnston) fell from the top-sail yard into the sea. Mate put the helm down at once, heaving him the main sheet, but he did not get it. In putting the helm down, wheel gear gave way, leaving the vessel unmanageable. After repairing the wheel, the ship was wore and stood towards the man but could not see him." The log is signed by John Lane, captain and John McKay, mate.
