LOCAL AND OTHER ITEMS.

FOR GOODS A SPECIALTY.—Beer Bros. I. O. O. F.—Widley Lodge. Full attendance requested.

THE COILA ARRIVES.—The steamer Coila has arrived safely at Havana—ten and a half days from Charlottetown.

FROM HALIFAX.—The City of Ghent arrived from Halifax this forenoon, and will sail on return via Souris this afternoon.

REV. THOS. CORBETT will preach at Covehead on Sunday, 11th inst., at 11 a.m., and at Brackley point Road at 3 p.m.

SUPREME COURT.—The argument in the case of Guterbridge vs. Owen was concluded today, and the Court adjourned until Tuesday next.

FOOTBALL.—The Wanderers defeated the Garrison at football at Halifax on Wednesday, by a score of 28 to 0. The game was the poorest of the series, and was more laughable than interesting.

POINTS FOR SHIPPERS.—The Bonavista will be due here from Montreal on Monday morning, 12th inst., and will sail for St. John's, Nfld., via Sydney, carrying horses, cattle and sheep on deck, and produce under deck.

NAVAL.—The sloop Bazzard sailed for Bermuda from Halifax on Tuesday. The flag-ship Blake sailed on the following day and the Pelican on Thursday.

TRANSIT OF MERCURY.—There will be a transit of Mercury to-morrow afternoon. It will begin at 12.4 and be completed at 5.13.

In less than an hour the two boarders left.

A DESPABLE DEED.—It is to be sincerely hoped that Messrs. Doid & Rogers will secure the conviction of the vagabonds that scrounged and disfigured the handsome brass signs on each side of their store entrance. This mean work of the corner laager is altogether too prevalent, and the signs of many of our stores continually suffer.

MARKET PRICES.—The attendance at the market to-day was very large, the supply, especially of produce outside, plentiful, and business lively. Prices show no very great change, but pork has fallen to 57 cents per pound for the carcasses.

THE HORSE TRADE.—The export of horses from Montreal to Great Britain from the beginning of navigation to the end of October reached the total of 5,095. For the fiscal year 1893, the shipments from all Canada to the old country were only 1,946; in 1892 they were but 1,396 while in 1890 they were 125. That a large market for Canadian horse flesh could be found in the United Kingdom has long been held as a theory; the experience of the present year promises to establish it as a fact.—Montreal Gazette.

DON'T FAIL TO ATTEND.—The Rev. G. M. Campbell will deliver a lecture in the Upper Methodist Church, on Tuesday evening next, November 13th, at 8 o'clock. His subject will be "The White City, or a Trip to the World's Fair." Admission—ladies, 10 cents; gentlemen, 15 cents. Proceeds for church purposes. As this will be the last time Rev. Mr. Campbell will deliver this lecture in Charlottetown, everyone should make a point of attending. A rare treat is in store for those who will be present on Tuesday night.

A SPOONER'S ASHORE.—A telegram was received here yesterday by Mr. F. W. Hyndman, stating that the schooner Kezia, from New York for Charlottetown, with 850 barrels of oil for Nelson Battenbury, was ashore at Petit de Grat, about seventy miles east of Arichat, and was almost a total wreck. All day yesterday the crew were endeavoring to land the cargo. The cargo was insured in the Reliance Marine. The Kezia was 135 tons, built at Conquer in 1882, and was owned by D. Landry, of Petit de Grat. She was insured for \$3,000.

CHRISTIAN ENDEAVOR CONVENTION.

The Christian Endeavor convention in Zion Church yesterday was well attended, and the proceedings throughout were of a very interesting character. At the afternoon session, after devotional exercises, the delegates from the city and country made brief reports, which showed the several societies to be in a very healthy condition.

It was suggested that the societies in each County should form themselves into a union so as to be in close touch with each other, and to be the better able to work more effectively for the Master; and a committee was appointed to receive the names of all the societies and the number of the associate and active members in each.

The evening session opened with devotional exercises, after which a good practical address was given by Rev. Andrew Rodgers, of New Glasgow, N. S., on the "Work of Christian Endeavorers." The choir then sang "What a friend we have in Jesus," after which brief and interesting addresses were delivered by Rev. W. J. Kirby and Rev. W. P. Archibald, of Cavendish.

A most interesting and instructive part of the programme at this session was "The Question Box," the answers being given by Rev. Mr. Rodgers. A short consecration service followed "The Question Box," which was led by Rev. Mr. Rodgers, many of the delegates taking part, after which the Convention closed by singing "God be with you till we meet again," and the benediction by Rev. Mr. Hamlyn.

Rev. D. Sutherland was elected President of Queen's County, C. H. White Secretary, and Miss Coffin Treasurer.

WHO IS MRS. JOHN SMITH?

On Thursday morning of last week a seven months' old infant was found on the doorstep of a man named Fred O'Brien, at St. John. There was some money with the child, and it was neatly dressed. On the clothes was a letter scrawled in a poor hand. It said that the mother was a widow and unable to support her child, and asked the inmates of the house for God's sake to take it in. The mother stated she belonged to the Protestant church, but she wanted her child brought up in the Roman Catholic faith.

It has since been ascertained that the mother of the child was a Mrs. John Smith, who left St. John on Friday morning for Boston. Mrs. Smith, the Telegraph says, came to St. John from P. E. Island in company with her husband, who for some time was engaged as driver for a well known grocery firm of Charlotte Street. About three years ago he took ill and died.

Where his wife had been boarding since, and what she had been doing could not be learned. The events of the three years she had kept to herself. About two months ago she moved to Dorchester street, St. John. Accompanying her was a girl of 14 years, whom she called her daughter. The mother, who it may be said was 42 years of age, was a lady of leisure, apparently having a supply of money. Her daughter remained with her. Nearly seven weeks ago the child which figured in the case was born.

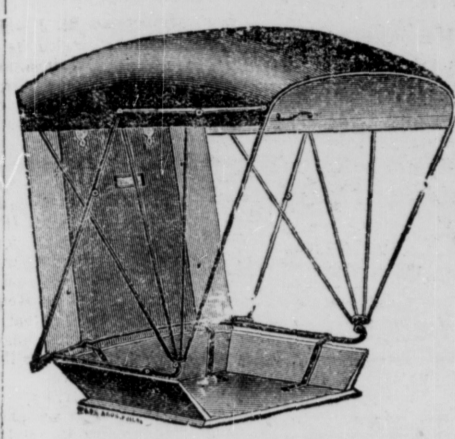
